FARM NEWS

Farm Equipment Dealers Sponsor Safety Week

This week July 20th to 26th is selected as National Farm Safety Week. In Ontario the program is designed to promote the necessity for safety in farm operations, upon the farm people of the province.

Farm operations involve many varied types of jobs. This is one of the main reasons for a high accident rate in farming. Coupled with this is the fact that farming is becoming more and more mechanized. Realizing this, the Canadian Federation of Farm Equipment dealers are sponsoring the National Farm Safety Week programme.

In an effort to determine the actual accident rate on farms, the Ont. Dept. of Agriculture has taken the first steps in conducting a farm accident survey, on a province wide basis. It is hoped that the information gained in the survey will assist in the development of a farm safety programme.

During this time of year farm tractors and heavy machinery are being used. This equipment can be a hazard unless properly used. Here are some rules to follow in safe tractor operation.

Keep the tractor in safe condition at all times.

Drive carefully along steep slopes and banks.

Always keep power takeoff shield and other safety shields in place.

Be careful when cranking any motor.

Don't permit extra riders at any time.

Don't travel at unsafe speeds.

Don't dismount from the tractor before stopping the power take-off.

Don't hitch to any part of the tractor except the drawbar.

Don't wear loose clothing.

Safety rules for tractor operation and the storage of fuels are given in the Ont. Dept. of Agriculture Circular 170, "Safety in Tractor Operation." This booklet is available from the Ont. Dept. of Agriculture office in Milton.

Remember, July 20th to 26th is National Farm Safety Week, so practice safe farming operations during this week and every week.

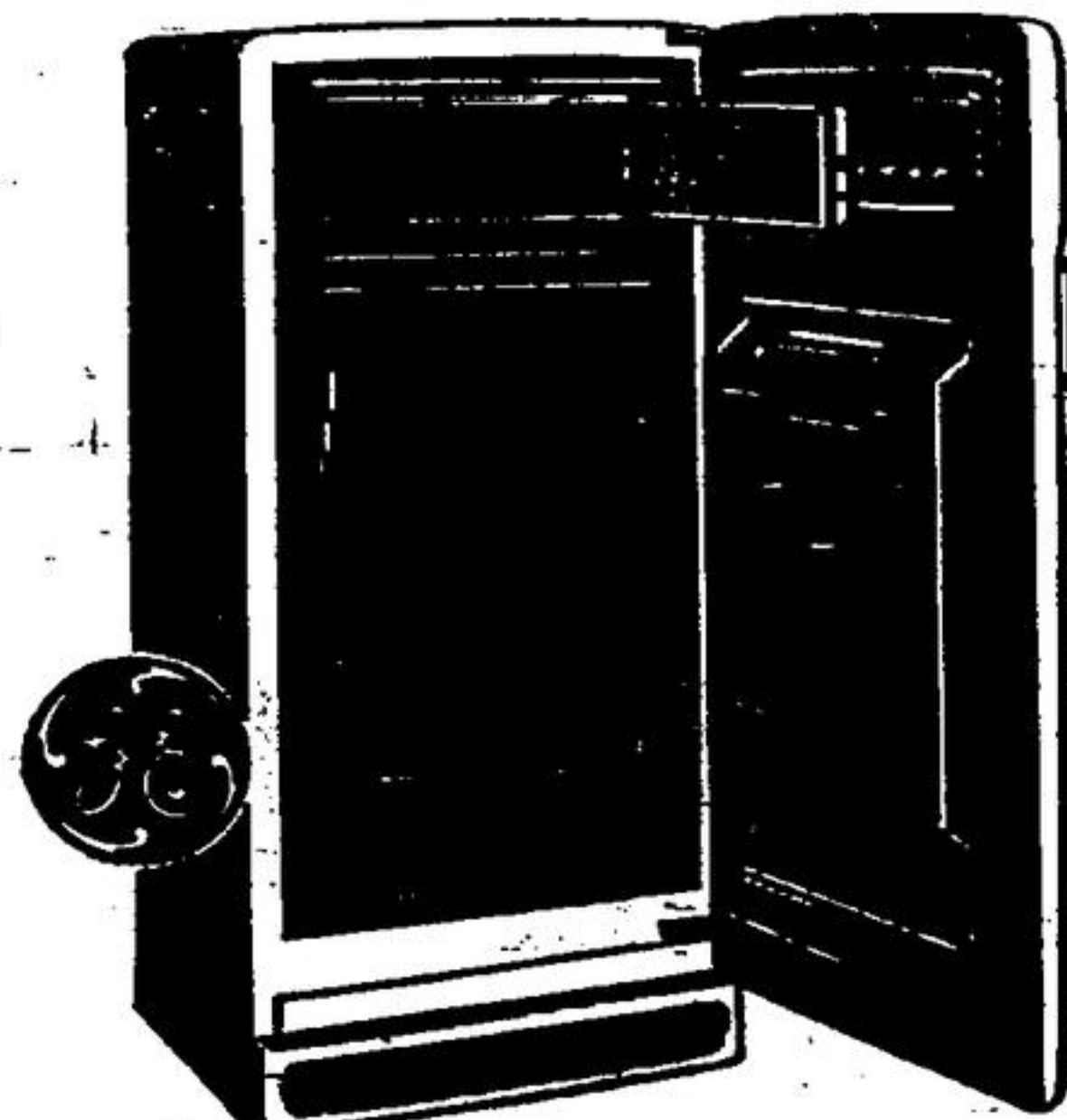

A former Norval resident now living in Orangeville, Doug Fendley, will be leaving for Africa on Friday where he has organized a safari for a big game hunt to last all through August. Accompanied by another Orangeville man, Harold Darraugh, Mr. Fendley will fly to Montreal, then to London, England and finally to Kenya the starting point.
