WHAT COUNCIL DID

**Town Will Sell Maple
Park District Properties**

A \$2600 contract for supplying street signs was awarded last week by council to Roscoe Metal Products, Hamilton.

Installation of the signs has already begun, with one of the first erected being on the Church and Main Street corner. The signs are cream letters on green background with Scotch-lite making them visible after dark to motorists.

A total of 582 signs are included in the order which will serve every part of town except the Delrex subdivision which has contracted to supply its own signs. Council decided to discuss with Delrex officials the possibility of providing a similar style sign there in order that signs will be uniform throughout the town.

The road committee was also asked to see that signs are erected pointing to the municipal parking area behind north-east Main Street. A large scale improvement program has been in progress for some time, with the town filling and grading properties owned by various individuals, with the understanding that the land can be used for public parking.

Council decided to pay expenses incurred by a town employee, Cliff Hibbert taking a course in assessing, and extended congratulations to him on successfully completing the course.

A letter from the municipal roads inspection department of the government, suggested further improvements which should be made in Delrex subdivision roads before the town accepts them. Reshaping of ditches and spreading of crushed gravel were recommended on several streets which the company has indicated its desire to turn over to the town.

Council indicated satisfaction with issuing of a house building permit to R. Kramer for a house at 22 Edith Street, providing the builder maintains a water course which runs through the property and gives the town an easement for this.

With John MacDonald opposed to selling property to the town for re-routing of Ann Street, council discussed the situation with engineer Wm. Carr and asked him to investigate further to see what could be done for a road which will serve several planned new homes in that area.

**Mrs. James Reid Chosen
Halton Dairy Princess**

Mrs. James C. Reid, of R. 2, Georgetown, was selected as Halton's Dairy Princess at the Hornby garden party on Saturday evening of last week. Mrs. Reid will now represent Halton in the dairy queen competition at the Canadian National Exhibition.

It will be recalled that the 1957 Ontario dairy queen was Miss Jean Peterson, of Hornby, and the preceding year, the winner, Mrs. Gordon King, of Oakville, R. R. No. 1. In short, Mrs. Reid is hopeful of bringing the title back to Halton for the third year in succession. Her competitors for the title of Halton's dairy princess, were Mary Lou Robinson, Oakville, R. R. 1, and Lorna Woodley, Milton R. R. 1 and it was with difficulty the panel of judges, namely John W. Pawley, secretary-manager of the Toronto Milk Producers; R. H. **Construction Worker Is
Injured at Park School**

A construction worker with the Lostraco Construction Co. Ltd. was rushed to a Toronto hospital Tuesday afternoon, July 8th following an accident at the Park public school.

Guiseppe Grazino of 7 Ellsworth Ave., Toronto was laying cement block at the school when a truck driven by Guiseppe Falcicchio of 878 Manning Ave., Toronto, struck the wall on which Mr. Grazino was working knocking him from his scaffold. Mr. Grazino struck his head on a pile of cement blocks near the wall and was hit with part of the wall as it crumbled.

Mr. Falcicchio was backing the truck close to the wall to dump a load of gravel fill when the right rear wheel slipped off the ramp throwing the truck heavily against the foundation. Mr. Grazino suffered severe head and chest injuries and was treated at the scene by Dr. Alistair Macintosh before being taken to hospital by the Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service.

The incident occurred at 2 p.m. Tuesday afternoon and was investigated by Georgetown PC Dan Whitson.

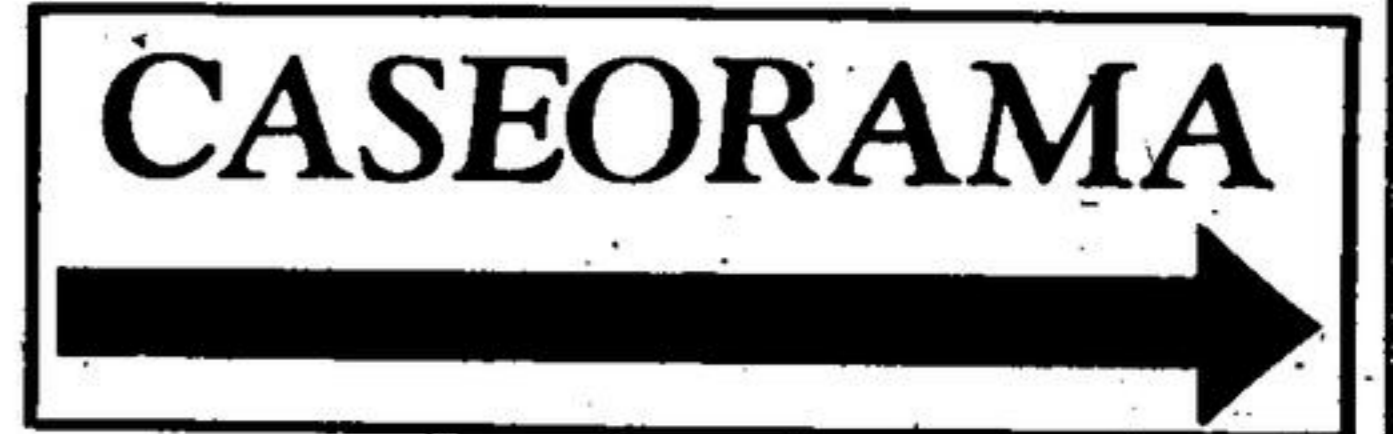
