Gun Discharges, Kills Local Woman's Nephew

A tragic accident at Seaford on Monday, brought sadness to two local families, when Ronald Tribble, 26 of Brampton died from an accidental bullet wound in the head.

Mr. Tribble, who is a nephew of Mrs. Jack Runham, 12 Parkview Blvd. and also a relative of Deputy-Reeve Walter Gray, was unpacking the trunk of his car when a rifle he moved discharged and the bullet struck him in the head. He died en route to a London hospital.

Mr. and Mrs. Tribble and their children, Douglas and Sharon had just arrived at Seaford on the first day of their vacation. They were visiting a former Brampton friend, George Hibbert. Mr. Tribble was employed at the Dale Estate.

He leaves his wife, Lucy Webster, his children Douglas and Sharon; his mother, Mrs. Jean Tribble and eight brothers and sisters. His father died suddenly only two months ago.

The funeral service will be held Thursday at the McKillop Funeral Home, Brampton, with interment in Orangeville Cemetery.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Appoint Frank Dennis, Barrie 7th Georgetown Policeman

A seventh policeman was added to the town force Monday, when council chose Frank Dennis of Barrie from seven applicants interviewed at a council meeting.

Mr. Dennis recently received his discharge from the army's provost corps which he joined two years ago. Prior to that he was a member of the Oshawa police force for three years. Mr. and Mrs. Dennis will be moving to town when he joins the force in the next few weeks.

He will serve with Police Chief Roy Haley, Corporal Jim Bilsborough and Constables Harley Lowe, Ted Scott, Dan Whitson and Evan Rollins.

Voting against hiring Mr. Dennis on Monday, Cr. Ern Hyde said his objection in no way reflected on the man, but that he feels the town is adequately served at present by a six-man force. Only reason given for the extra man, he said, has been that Georgetown has reached 7,000 population and the fact that the force will be short-handed during vacation period.

Police chairman John Elliott said his committee had thoroughly studied the question and was unanimous in believing it time to add to the force. The town is becoming more spread out, he said, and introduction of the uniform traffic ticket will add considerably to police duties in future.

D. M. W. (Bill) Wilson, public relations director for Delrex Developments, questioned council about a newspaper report last week of a \$2600 contract awarded for street signs in the older part of town.

Contrary to council's belief, he said the Delrex firm has no agreement with the town to supply its own street signs.

"Any signs we have erected are temporary," he said. "Feeling is a little high among subdivision dwellers that they are to be ignored in this project."

Mayor Armstrong said council had been somewhat confused and admitted Mr. Wilson was correct.

Hobbies and Hard Work Help Keep You Young

"Hobbies and hard work keep a person young," was William Taylor's recipe for celebrating 50 years of married life and not looking a day over 60. Mr. Taylor's hobby is writing poetry, and one line from a special poem he wrote to his wife on their 50th wedding anniversary expresses his feeling "I've loved you down the years from long ago." Mrs. Taylor has had many hobbies through the years, but the biggest one is keeping her husband happy.

Mr. and Mrs. Taylor were born in Scotland. They married in Elgin, Morayshire, July 10, 1908. Friends emigrated to the Canadian west, and it wasn't too long before the lure of the unknown country beckoned and the Taylors and their two children decided they would go west and farm in Saskatchewan.

Farming in Saskatchewan from 1925 to 1937 had its drawbacks. It was unfortunate that this couple should choose such a time to make their new home in the west. Mr. Taylor vividly remembers one July 6th when a frost killed all their crops. At that time a farmer was lucky to get 50 cents a bushel for wheat and about half that amount for oats. The water supply failed and living became more difficult each year.

In 1935 they came east. They lived in Georgetown until 1953, when Brampton became their home. They now live at 52 Union Street.

TAKE NOTICE that the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Georgetown did pass on the 15th day of May, 1958, By-Law No. 10 to authorize the borrowing of the sum of One Hundred and Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$170,000.00) by the issue of debentures to the principal amount of \$170,000.00 bearing interest at the rate of five and three quarters per centum (5 3/4%) per annum from 1958 to 1964, six per centum (6%) per annum from 1964 to 1969, six and a quarter per centum (6 1/4%) per annum from 1969 to 1974, six and a half per centum (6 1/2%) per annum from 1974 to 1978, payable annually and maturing in twenty annual instalments of principal of varying amounts as set forth in Schedule "A" hereto.

The purpose for which the money is to be borrowed is for the building and equipping of an eight classroom school.

The security for the amount to be borrowed is as follows:
(a) During twenty years, the currency of the debentures, the respective sums set forth in the fourth column of Schedule "A" hereto are required to be levied and collected annually by the said Board by a special rate sufficient therefore over and above all other rates in the same manner and from the like persons and property by, from, upon or out of which other separate school rates may be levied, raised and collected by the said Board.

(b) The debentures, as to both principal and interest are a charge upon the Separate School rates and upon the school house property and premises and any other real or personal property vested in the said Board.
