CO-OP MEDICAL CATASTROPHE FUND DISTRIBUTES \$1,923.

This is the fourth year that Halton Co-operative Medical Services has given extra benefits from the Catastrophe Fund. Nine members received a total of \$1,923.00, their cheques ranging from \$3.00 to \$663.73 according to their claims, the method of payment being that the member pays the first \$225.00 after the highest coverage obtainable from the Co-operative is considered.

An improved Catastrophe Plan known as the Major Medical Plan will be introduced effective January 1st, 1959, with rates being \$10.00 for families and \$5.00 for single persons. Many members are asking for supplementary coverage for semi-private and private room care and this will be included in the Major Medical benefits along with any extra expenses involved in a major illness. This will include ambulance services, special nursing care, medicines and doctors' calls. The member will pay \$100 over and above the highest possible coverage obtainable from the government hospital insurance and co-operative plans. The surgical at \$30.00 for families and \$15.00 for single persons will also be offered.

As a special service the Halton Co-operative Medical Services will

also be enrolling their members this month with the Ontario Hospital Services Commission and collecting premiums for their members and any others who desire one or both of the Co-op plans offered. In 10 years of operation the medical co-op in Halton County has paid over \$300,000 in claims for its membership of 1,100, administration being such that only one year in that period showed a few dollars loss.

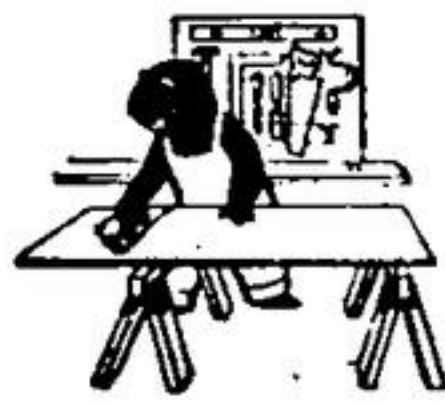

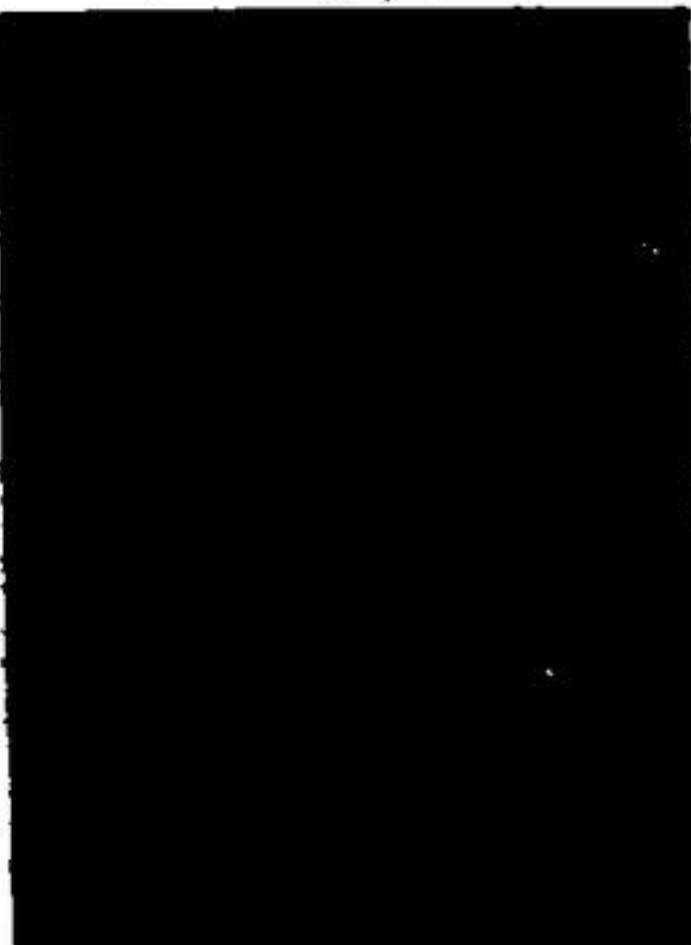
