Child Killed, New Baby Dies After Massachusetts Crash

ACCIDENT VICTIM WAS RELATIVE OF NOTRE DAME FARM RESIDENT

Unidentified at publication time last week when a fatal accident was reported at the intersection of the 8th Line and No. 5 Sideroad, the accident vicitim was Arthur Martel, 41 of Vinemount.

The Ruddell bush is located about a field away from the Davison barn. The Saturday fire call was turned in at about ten minutes to three.
