Child Killed, New Baby Dies After Massachusetts Crash

ACCIDENT VICTIM WAS RELATIVE OF NOTRE DAME FARM RESIDENT

Unidentified at publication time last week when a fatal accident was reported at the intersection of the 8th Line and No. 5 Sideroad, the accident victim was Arthur Martel, 41 of Vinemount.

Mr. Martel, whose wife, Marie St. Jean, is a sister of Miss Therese St. John of Notre Dame de Beaugard Farm, was en route to the farm to assist in killing sheep. He frequently visited the farm to help his sister-in-law and the boys in their farm operations.

Mr. Martel's panel truck and a gravel truck driven by Charles Hoeffle of Harriston collided at the intersection on Wednesday morning. Georgetown fire department was called when the gravel truck caught fire, and the local ambulance brigade removed Mr. Hoeffle to Milton Hospital where he was treated for minor injuries and shock.

A native of Montreal, Mr. Martel operated a fruit farm at Vinemount and also worked at the Oakville Basket Co. He leaves his wife, one daughter Jacqueline and his mother, six brothers and a sister in Montreal.

At the time of the accident, Miss St. Jean was just leaving on a business trip to Hamilton. Seeing the fire truck go past the farm, and mindful of a barn fire just down the road the previous Monday at the Lloyd Davison farm, she waited to see that the fire was not in the vicinity. As she left the farm, she heard the ambulance go by, unaware that tragedy was striking close to home. She was notified of the accident when stopped by a police car near Hamilton, as police were contacting relatives.

Stubborn Bush Blaze Spread From Grass Fire

A bush on the property of A. J. Ruddell, R.R. 2 Georgetown, was threatened by fire for the third time this week when stumps on the edge of the wooded area broke into flame Saturday afternoon. The stumps were originally ignited by sparks from the Davison barn fire last week and since then have necessitated three visits by the brigade.

Each time when the stumps appeared out sparks have stayed alive in the roots under the ground to cause the recurrences. On Saturday stumps, grass and underbrush were all ablaze by the time firemen arrived and had to be beat out with shovels and then doused with water. The Ruddell bush is located about a field away from the Davison barn. The Saturday fire call was turned in at about ten minutes to three.

A holiday turned into a tragedy July 26th when Mrs. G. A. Robinson, 22 Guelph St., and her daughter and husband, Mr. and Mrs. Duncan Reed and their baby daughter Nanette motored to Amherst, Massachusetts, to visit with Mrs. Robinson's other daughters, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Kielbasa of South Amherst and Mr. and Mrs. Edmund Keyes of South Valley Rd., Pelham.

While on holidays in Amherst Mr. and Mrs. Reed, Nanette and Nola Kielbasa, Mrs. Robinson's granddaughter were driving when a truck hit their passenger car on its right side, pushing it out of an intersection to the east and partly off the south side of the road. The impact caused the doors on the left side of the car to open and Nola Kielbasa to be thrown from the car and fatally injured. She was seven years old. Mrs. Reed and Nanette who were riding in the front seat had to be extricated through the left side of the car.

Mr. Reed, who was taken to Cooley Dickinson Hospital was under observation for possible internal injuries. The baby who suffered cuts and bruises is still in the Northampton Memorial Hospital. Mrs. Reed who was an expectant mother at the time of the accident was apparently in satisfactory condition but gave birth to a premature son the following day, who died shortly after birth.

Funeral service for the baby who was named Duncan K. Reed, was held at the R. D. Newell Jr. funeral home with Rev. Ronald Wade officiating. Burial was in Pelham Cemetery. He is survived by his parents, baby sister Nanette and his grandmother Mrs. G. A. Robinson, 22 Guelph Street, and his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Bert Reed of Plaster Rock, New Brunswick.

Nola Marie Kielbasa who was born on September 16th, 1950, in Northampton, Mass., was a pupil in the third grade of South Amherst School and she leaves her parents, her grandparents, Mrs. Karolina Kielbasa of South Amherst and Mrs. G. A. Robinson of Georgetown. Her funeral service was at Czelusniak Funeral Home, Northampton, followed by a Mass of the Angels at 9 a.m. in Holy Rosary Church. Burial was in Holy Rosary Cemetery, Hadley, Mass.

Modification in a ruling of the Ontario Municipal Board concerning financing of Georgetown's proposed sewage disposal plant were contained in a letter from the board to the Ontario Water Resources Commission read at council meeting last night.

Originally, the board had said that debentures could be issued for the \$830,000 plant only if (1) Delrex Developments posts a bond guaranteeing payment of \$147,000; (2) the \$147,000 to be received from Delrex be applied directly to the capital cost of the plant; (3) cost will not exceed \$830,000; and (4) Georgetown will not contract any further capital debt other than waterworks or hydro until 1961.

of the town and Delrex, and modified all clauses other than the cost restriction.

The Municipal Board now says that Georgetown can build a new public school at an estimated cost of \$500,000 (removing a major stumbling block to any large scale housing construction as planned in Delrex) and of certain storm sewers up to \$50,000.

A performance bond replaces the previous Delrex restriction, and only actual money received from the firm, should the industrial ratio not be maintained in the new area, will be applied to the plant construction.

The board has now granted tentative approval and promises final approval providing capital cost does not exceed \$830,000.

Following the reading of the letter last night, council gave third reading to a by-law authorizing the mayor and clerk to execute an agreement with the Water Resources Commission to proceed with the disposal plant.

A suggestion by the Proctor & Redfern engineering firm that Georgetown consider adopting an industrial waste by-law to require pre-treatment of industrial wastes before entering the sewer system was turned over to the public works committee for study.

Alarmed by a drowning at a swimming pool in the county, Crown Attorney P. K. McWilliams suggested in a letter that municipalities require life guards at all public pools.

As Georgetown's pool is so protected, council took no action on the matter.

Accident Injuries are Fatal for Former Garage Operator

A retired Georgetown garage man, Ray (Pop) Bowers, 63, was fatally injured in a head-on collision Saturday morning on No. 28 Highway near Bobcaygeon.

He died in Lindsay hospital at 8:00 p.m. that evening.

The Bowers car and a loaded soft drink truck met head-on at the crest of a hill while Mr. Bowers was enroute to Bancroft where he had intended to build a cottage. The left front, a wheel and the driver's side of the car were sheared off in the collision. Truck driver Gary Hancock, Peterborough escaped injury. The truck was only slightly damaged, but broken glass and soft drink bottles and cases were strewn over a wide area.

Mrs. Mildred Bastedo, a passenger in Mr. Bowers' car, was treated at hospital for bruises to the head, chest and left arm and released. The Bowers' car was one of a party of three enroute to Bancroft. Others in the party did not witness the accident.

A Bancroft native, Mr. Bowers was a garage operator in Toronto for several years before moving to Georgetown 12 years ago where he purchased a business from Art Speight and operated the Chrysler-Plymouth agency until selling two years ago to Herkes & Raycroft. He was a member of Georgetown Curling Club and one of the best supporters of the Raiders hockey team.

His wife, Frances Lyman died in 1949. He leaves two sons, Gerald and Gordon of town; 6 grandchildren; and three brothers and four sisters.

Rev. Lloyd Freel of Norval conducted the funeral service on Tuesday at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home and interment was in Park Lawn Cemetery, Toronto. Pallbearers were: George Cleave, Ernie Curry, Peter Simpson, Harold Cleave, Wray Balsey and Ben McHarg.
