The Georgetown Herald.
Dear Sir:
I would like to inform you and
the public of the achievements of
our association since its creation
in January of this year with a
view to explaining the reason for
the field day to be held in the
Park on September 6th, and out-
lining the programme for that
day at present under considera-
tion.

At the beginning of the sum-
mer we registered more than 400
children in the 8 to 12 years of
age group, and organized them in
teams participating in base-
ball, softball, and soccer and re-
ceiving coaching, practice and
competitive games. Throughout
the summer we have had available
to us nine ball diamonds and one
soccer pitch in the park. We have
been prevented from extending

our field day on September 6th
is intended to terminate appro-
priately, our summer sports pro-
gramme. We are currently con-
sidering a programme of indoor
sport and recreation for the win-
ter months, should suitable accom-
modation become available.

The programme for this day,
subject to some modification at
this stage — starts with a parade
through the town to the hand-
stand in the park, where the op-
ening ceremonies will take place.
During the course of the day,
play-off matches are scheduled be-
tween the top teams in the base-
ball and soccer leagues organized
at the beginning of this summer;
while later in the day it is hoped
to entertain teams from Oshawa
and Acton and other towns. By
no means least amongst the day's
attractions is a beauty contest to
be held to determine "Miss Geo-
getown of 1958", with preliminary
judging to take place during the
afternoon, and the finals to be
judged during an intermission in
the dance, the latter scheduled to
commence at 8.00 p.m. at the Ar-
mouries. A refreshment booth
will be in operation through the
day. During the dance in the
evening, the draw for the holders
of the winning tickets of our
community centre draw will take
place — tickets are currently on
sale. Combining with the dance
to terminate the day's activities,
we are offering an open invita-
tion for all to attend a giant wein-
er and corn roast.

Our president, Mr. John Hole
(Windsor Road), would be grate-
ful to anyone offering their assis-
tance for the field day program,
and we are all hopeful that we
shall see every resident of Geo-
getown attending the park during
some part of the day.
