SIMAZIN FAILS IN 1958 BLAME MOISTURE LACK

"I am not discouraged that Simazin failed to give satisfactory results in 1958," stated Prof. Geo. Jones of the Dept. of Field Husbandry, OAC, when addressing the Twilight meeting at the farm of Ford Wickson near Ashgrove. Simazin is the chemical which prior to this year had given such outstanding results as a pre-emergence spray for corn. The Wickson corn was planted on May 19, and the following day two acres of the field was treated by Prof. Jones. Two pounds of Simazin with 30 gals. of water was applied to the acre.

Experimental work with the material had been conducted over the past several years with excellent results. Last year it was placed on a field scale — as a matter of fact in August of 1957 your "Ag Rep" personally inspected a field of silage corn which had been so treated — no cultivation had been practiced and without question, it was the cleanest field of corn we had ever seen and that goes back to the time folk used to hoe their corn. While similar tests have worked in other areas this year, apparently here in Halton we did not receive sufficient moisture in late May and June to enable the chemical to function.

Some fifty folk were in attendance for the Twilight programme which also included an inspection of the replicated plots of some six varieties of barley and seven varieties of oats — in all a total of 52 plots were involved, and these thanks to Mr. Wickson were in excellent condition.

It was a most interesting discussion on cereal grains, legumes and weed control, which was ably led by Prof. Jones. Members of the Acton 4-H Forage Club; the Halton 4-H Forage Club; the Halton 4-H Grain Club; and the Halton 4-H Potato Club, plus a goodly number of adults, were in attendance for the interesting programme, at the conclusion of which the entire group were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Wickson for refreshments.

Mrs. Cassidy thanked the Lorne Scots for their remembrance, but with a smile, informed them that "I didn't wait home for Brig. Cassidy — I joined the militia myself."

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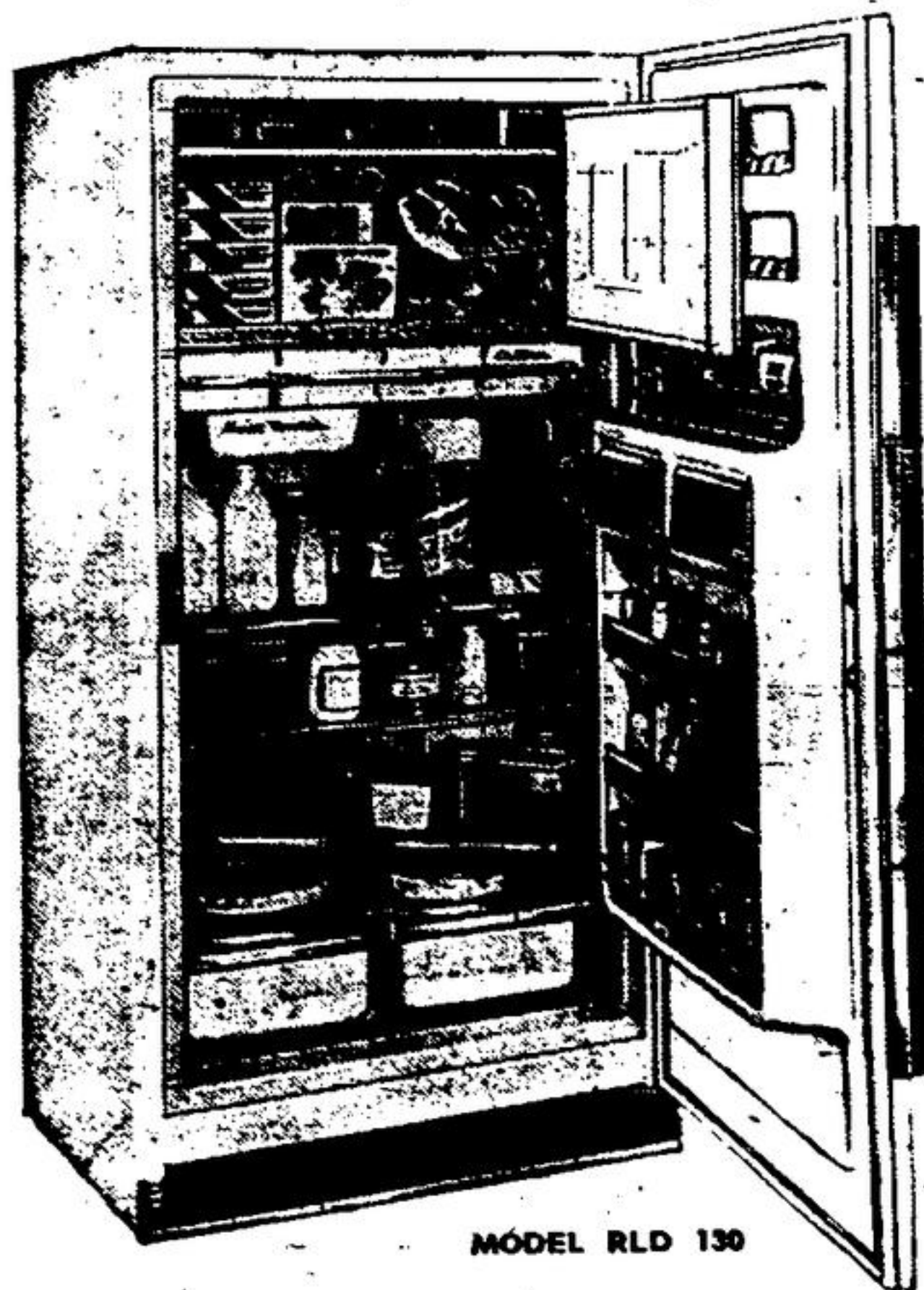
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
