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Million Orenda Man Hours With No Lost Time Accident

For the third time in less than five years, 1,000,000 consecutive man hours have been worked at Orenda Engines Limited, Malton, without a single lost time accident.

The two previous records were established in the fall of 1953 and in late 1955 and 1956. Orenda people are still working on this third period, having posted more than 1,200,000 hours worked without a lost time accident to date.

Executive vice-president and General Manager Earle K. Brownridge, in congratulating Orenda personnel for the effort which has made this record possible, said: "This new record has been established at a time when we are busily preparing for the manufacture of the Iroquois engine. The achievement is most remarkable, occurring as it has during a period of change and abnormal pressure."

He urged employees to strive for the 2,000,000 hour mark for the first time in the company's history. There are approximately 5,000 people working an average 40 hour week at Orenda.

FARM IMPROVEMENT LOANS SEVENTY MILLION IN 1957

A total of 57,988 farmers, including some in this area, borrowed \$69,427,873 under the provisions of the Farm Improvement Loans Act in 1957. These figures were disclosed in the Annual Report of the Act tabled in the House of Commons by the Honourable Donald M. Fleming, minister of Finance.

The report notes the lending for the year is down slightly from the previous year. Only two provinces, Ontario and Quebec, show increases over the 1956 lending.

Loans for the purchase of farm implements again represent the largest percentage of loans, being 84% of the total. For the first time in the history of the legislation a province other than a western province obtained the most loans for the financing of tractors. A change in dairy production practices, particularly in the central provinces, is noted. There were 569 Ontario farmers who obtained loans for the purchase of bulk milk installations and Quebec farmers obtained 643 loans for the purchase of milk coolers.

The report states that 758 new farm houses were financed during the year. A total of \$6,000,233 was lent to 3,974 farmers to assist in financing the construction, alteration and repair of farm buildings including houses in 1957.

The sum of \$4,272,399 was loaned to 4,557 farmers for the purchase of livestock in 1957.

Repayment of these intermediate short term loans remains at a high level. During 1957 there was \$73,634,665 repaid, which exceeded the amount borrowed by \$4,026,792. Losses for the year amounted to \$180,822 represented by 257 claims. Since the inception of the legislation in 1954 a total of \$722,957,000 has been lent. The loss total for the same period has amounted to \$618,822, being slightly less than 1 tenth of 1 percent.

The report states that the outstanding debt as a whole is regarded as good, that the borrowers are widely distributed, that on the average they are comparatively young, being just over 42 years of age, and that they are basically in a sound financial position — 38% of all borrowers have unencumbered farms.

HOG MARKETING PLAN APPROVED

We learn from the Ontario Farm Products Marketing Board that 67.8 per cent of the Ontario Hog Producers who voted cast a "Yes" vote. A total of 78,685 Ontario farmers had been registered as eligible voters and of this number 53,773 availed themselves of the opportunity of voting on the Ontario Hog Producer Marketing Plan. In Halton 296 votes were cast and of this number 76.4 per cent voted in favour.

It is a bit unfortunate, as we see it, that a larger percentage of the eligible voters did not cast their ballots, which, perhaps, would have resulted in a more decisive indication of the Hog Producers' wishes.



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
