#### CCF Claims Credit for Gas Stock Revelations

"The letter of resignation by Mr. Mapledorem to Premier Frost sounds like a letter Frank James might have written to his brother Jesse apologizing, not for the of fence committed, but for getting caught," said Jack Henry, CCF provincial candidate, speaking at a meeting in Milton Steelworkers

Hall on July 7th. Mr. Henry credited the CCF with revealing irregularities in the purchase of gas stock by members of the Ontario legislature. First pooh-poohed by Premier Frost, who said the CCF was ungentlemanly for even mentioning it and refused to set up an impartial investigation committee, a subsequent government investigation led to the resignations of three Conservative cabinet ministers, and revealed that the provincial Liberal head, John Wintermeyer, was also a shareholder, he

Mr. Henry criticized Mr. Frost for calling a vote on hog marketing on July 25th, saying the premier is doing his best to defeat the effort of the hog producers to establish a democratic marketing board, by calling a vote in the farmers' busiest month. He suggested that the government is catering to the big packing companies

by so doing. Referring to the recent Manitoba elections, Mr. Henry said the OCF more than doubled their members there. With no clear majority for any party, he said itis possible another election this year could result in a COF provincial government there.
