## Sugar and Spice

### CCF Claims Credit for Gas Stock Revelations

"The letter of resignation by Mr. Mapledorem to Premier Frost sounds like a letter Frank James might have written to his brother Jesse apologizing, not for the offence committed, but for getting caught," said Jack Henry, CCF provincial candidate, speaking at a meeting in Milton Steelworkers Hall on July 7th.

Mr. Henry credited the CCF with revealing irregularities in the purchase of gas stock by members of the Ontario legislature. First pooh-poohed by Premier Frost, who said the CCF was ungentlemanly for even mentioning it and refused to set up an impartial investigation committee, a subsequent government investigation led to the resignations of three Conservative cabinet ministers, and revealed that the provincial Liberal head, John Wintermeyer, was also a shareholder, he said.

Mr. Henry criticized Mr. Frost for calling a vote on bog marketing on July 25th, saying the premier is doing his best to defeat the effort of the hog producers to establish a democratic marketing board, by calling a vote in the farmers' busiest month. He suggested that the government is catering to the big packing companies by so doing.

Referring to the recent Manitoba elections, Mr. Henry said the CCF more than doubled their members there. With no clear majority for any party, he said it is possible another election this year could result in a CCF provincial government there.

Including Prime Minister Diefenbaker in his comments, Mr. Henry said Conservative provincial governments are being favoured, and cited the case where the fed-

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eral government will pay almost the entire cost of a power project in the maritimes, but is paying only \$75 million towards a \$180 million project in Saskatchewan. The basic difference between the CCF and other political parties, he said, is that the CCF believes in providing service to the people at cost, whereas the others like to have a middleman who will donate some of the cream to their party campaign funds. Car insurance is an example, he said. In Saskatchewan it costs \$25 to insure a car for everything. In Ontario the same policy would cost over \$100. The difference, he claims, goes to provide the million dollar profits for private companies, part of which is donated to the "old party" campaign funds.
