Maclaren Family Revisiting Native Scottish Homeland

Mr. and Mrs. Alex Maclaren, 194 Maple Ave. E., flew from Malton on August 1st for a holiday in their native Scotland. It is a combined pleasure and business trip for Mr. Maclaren who will also visit the continent in connection with his work for the Board of Home Missions of the United

Church and the Canadian Council of Churches.
A veteran overseas traveller, this will be Mr. Maclaren's eighth trip abroad, though his first by air. Mrs. Maclaren had a trip to Scotland after the first war. Landing at Prestwick last week, Mr. Maclaren spent a week in London on business while his wife visited at Gatehouse of Fleet with a sister, Mrs. George Scott and at Lockbie with her brother, David Wallace.

This Saturday, they will meet their son Bill and his wife, who will also cross by plane from their home at Greenwich, Connecticut, and the foursome will make an extensive tour of Scotland. Starting at Lockerbie, they will visit Wemyss Bay, Skelmorley, take a boat trip to Arran, then through the Troscachs to Crianlarich and Oban. Travelling by boat to Iona, they will view the reconstruction of an old abbey, promoted by the Rev. McLeod, now moderator of the Church of Scotland.

After visiting Ft. William, Arisaig, Mallaig, and Inverness, they will go through Killiecrankie Pass to Grandtully, Aberfeldy and Dunkeld to Perth; then to Dundee, St. Andrew's, Anstruther, Elie, Kircaldy and Inverkeithing. In Edinburgh they will attend the famous festival. Mrs. Maclaren, Bill and his wife are planning to return home in early September.

On September 3rd, Mr. Maclaren begins an air tour when he will visit several continental cities, including Paris, Genoa, Rome, Athens, Munich, Salzburg, Stuttgart, Frankfurt, Hamburg, Bremen and Brussels, returning home in early October. In Germany, he will visit the grave of their son, Sgt. Stewart Maclaren at Bad Tolz, who was killed on active service with the RCAF in World War II.

Worried Neighbour Calls Police, Find Lady Dead

Rev. Alex Calder conducted the funeral service on Saturday for Miss Marion Bathgate, 80, who died at her home, 24 Edith St., earlier in the week.

Her death was discovered when a neighbour, Mrs. Albert Patten, 9 William St., became worried because she had noticed no activity in the house since the previous Sunday night when a local doctor had called. Checking on Wednesday with the doctor, she learned that he had treated Miss Bathgate for a cold, and it was decided to contact the police.

Constables Rollins and Whiston went to the house about 9:30 p.m., and getting no response to knocking, and finding all downstairs doors locked, they gained entry through an upstairs window and found the owner dead in the hallway. She had apparently suffered a weak spell some time previously.

A native of Eramosa Township, she was the daughter of the late Peter and Elizabeth Bathgate and was the last member of her family. A physical therapist, she had been employed in several military hospitals after the first war, spending some time in Weyburn, Saskatchewan, in Guelph, Whitby, and Toronto. She obtained her training at Columbia University in New York after attending school in Guelph.

She moved to Georgetown from Toronto several years ago, purchasing the Bruce MacKenzie house when the MacKenzie family moved to Hamilton. She was a member of the Park Circle of Knox Presbyterian Church and of the lawn bowling club.

Closest survivors are several nieces and nephews. Andy Bathgate, New York Ranger hockey star and one of the top scorers in the NHL is a nephew.

Interment was made in Woodlawn Cemetery, Guelph, following the funeral service here last Saturday.
