

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Committee, Chairman Duties Argued at Council Meeting

Duties of committees and committee chairmen caused two sudden storms at the August 18th council meeting.

Midway through a discussion on the possibility of privately contracting sanitary landfill, Cr. Alfred Sykes criticized the administration committee for encroaching on his public works committee.

Mayor Armstrong was explaining that the administration committee had empowered him to approach the garbage collector for a price on land filling when Cr. Sykes launched his attack.

"It's nice to hear about what's happening," he said. "Though I think proper procedure would have been to ask the public works committee to investigate."

"We were just interested in the cost. If we went ahead with such a plan, it would certainly go through your committee," said the mayor.

"If the administration committee is looking for it, they should be the public works committee," replied Cr. Sykes.

The mayor asked for a show of hands and a majority favoured turning the matter over to public works.

Later in the meeting, Cr. Harrison criticized police chairman John Elliott for not bringing a police committee report on parking meters before council.

A majority at a police committee meeting had favoured recommending meters on Main St. S., he said.

Cr. Elliott said the meeting had been attended by himself, Cr. Harrison and the mayor. He did not favour more meters, he said, and

Cr. Harrison goes, and the mayor had also expressed agreement with more meters.

"When I agree, I'll bring it to council," he said.

"It's your duty to bring it, even though you don't agree," said Cr. Harrison.

Permission was given for construction of a house on a 40x132 lot on King St. owned by the John Treason estate, which does not conform with the building by-law, but which has been okayed by the adjoining resident.

Permission was also given to a property owner at 56 Sargent Rd. to erect a carport which does not conform to the by-law, but which has been okayed by the adjoining resident.

A large tree on Church Street which he termed dangerous, has been trimmed, said Cr. Sykes, and Jim Lyons, whose property backs the tree has given a signed statement, that he will not hold the town liable for damages caused if the tree falls.

Council was notified by the Chamber of Commerce that two refuse containers have been added, one near the Cottage Inn Restaurant and one at the post office.

Copy of an industrial waste control by-law used in Aurora was received from the Proctor & Redfern engineering firm. It could be used as a model for a Georgetown by-law, the company said, and they will be pleased to go into more detailed discussion should council decide to proceed.

Frank Dennis Seventh Man on Police Force

Selected from seven applicants interviewed by council some weeks ago, Cst. Frank Dennis has begun duties with the local police department, expanding the force to a new high of seven men. Cst. Dennis joined the force last week.

Born in Oshawa, he received his education there and was with General Motors before joining the Oshawa force in December of 1953. While in his three years with the Oshawa Dept. he operated a boys club there and in the winter ran a highly successful juvenile hockey team.

In September, 1956 he joined the army provost corps and was with them at Barrie until recently receiving his discharge and being accepted here. Six years ago he married the former Sally Collicutt of Whitby, who will be joining him here as soon as accommodation can be located.

The local department now has five constables including, Harley Lowe, Ted Scott, Dan Whitson and Eyan Rollins under Cpl. Jim Bilsborrow and chief Roy Haley.

Promotion of Weeklies Subject at Convention

Weekly editors and publishers with their wives and families, representing most of Canada's 690 English weekly newspapers, will gather at the King Edward Hotel here September 4, 5 and 6, for the 39th annual convention of the Canadian Weekly Newspaper Association.

The three-day meeting will centre around discussions of the problems facing the industry and sessions will be held with representatives of advertisers and agencies and the Audit Bureau of Circulation.

Highlighting the discussions, both formal and informal, will be the matter of better promotion of the weekly newspapers as an important medium for local and national advertisers.

This is expected to bring official sanction by delegates for the inauguration and support of a fulltime promotion and public relations department in the CWNA national offices in Toronto.

According to William Telfer, CWNA managing director, promotion of weekly newspapers as an important medium will go a long way towards increasing revenues thereby assisting many weeklies now finding it hard to hold advertising and subscription rates at present levels and still meet rising costs.

Combined circulation of the English weeklies in Canada has now passed the 1/4 million mark, Mr. Telfer said.

A number of national associations and companies will entertain delegates at various luncheons and the Government of Ontario will give a dinner.

Among guests expected will be John Thompson, managing director of the Northlife group of weeklies in the United Kingdom. He is currently touring Canada. Lucien Fontaine, of Val D'Or, president of the French Language Weekly Newspapers of Canada is

WEED CONTROL NEWS

While travelling through Halton County during the morning at this time of year you will no doubt be impressed by the bright blue colour of many fields, here and there. The first impression may be of beauty but we wish to remind you that you may be seeing an example of property overrun with a bad weed called chicory.

If not kept under control it can be very troublesome on any property either rural or urban.

"Chicory" or "wild succory" is a perennial weed introduced from Europe, has a long deep tap root which when dried and ground up has sometimes been used as a substitute for coffee. The stems are almost leafless, from 1 to 3 feet high, much branched, slightly hairy and whitish in colour. The leaves spreading out on the ground, are long with irregular edges. The flowers are about 1 1/2 inches across, they grow in clusters on the stalks, are bright blue in colour and usually close up by noon. Its seeds are small and one plant can produce as many as 3,000.

Like "wild carrot" it is seldom troublesome in well cultivated fields and short crop rotations, but spreads very rapidly and persists in long term sod and pasture fields, fence bottoms and idle land. However, in these places it may be controlled by spraying with 16 oz., 2, 4-d acid per acre. According to the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture best results are obtained when the spraying is done in early June. When control consists of mowing repeated cutting is necessary to prevent seeds from ripening.

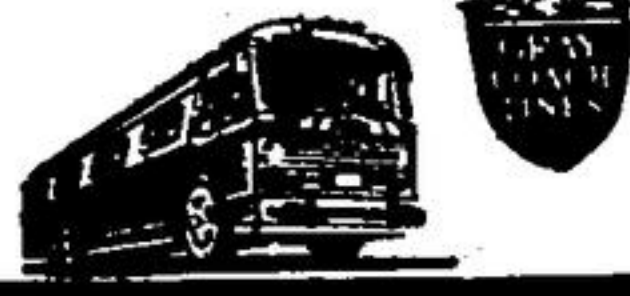

School Foreman Breaks Back, Scaffold Fall

For the second time this summer an employee of the Q. Los-tracco Construction Co. has been seriously injured at Park public school. Patrick Foster of Newmarket who just recently joined the construction crew here from Etobicoke to supervise the remaining work on the building was rushed to hospital after suffering a broken back in a fall from a scaffold late Friday afternoon.

Mr. Foster was taken to Toronto General Hospital by Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service after being treated at the scene by Dr. C. A. Thompson. He was directing the placing of a girder from a scaffold near the top of the east wall when he fell to the hard floor of the building.

The accident left the school without a supervisor for the second time since construction started on the building some three months ago.

Cpl. Jim Bilsborrow investigated the accident and radioed ahead for a Toronto police escort to meet the ambulance at the Humber bridge. The mishap occurred at about 4:30 p.m.

Earlier in the summer one of the labourers at the school was badly hurt when a gravel truck slipped off a ramp and knocked a portion of the wall in on top of him.
