**Churchill Cigar Fails to Puzzle on TV Panel Show**

One of the first local men to appear on a national television show is Bob Hardman, 8 Normandy Blvd. He was a contestant on One of a Kind, a CBC panel show originating in Toronto, which was telecast Friday at 8.30 p.m.

His appearance came about when Herald editor Walter Biehn remembered a curio Bob brought back from overseas after serving with the Canadian army. It was an authentic Churchill cigar, half-smoked and bearing the famous Briton's teeth marks. He submitted the idea to Alex Barris, emcee of the show, and Mr. Hardman

was duly contacted and signed for an appearance.

Format of the program is for the panel to identify an object associated with a famous person, or a person himself, during a 4 minute question period by panelists Alan Manning, Lloyd Bochner, Kathy McNeil and Rita Greer Allen. They are told only one thing about the puzzle, in Mr. Hardman's case that it was an object. The guest artist receives a flat fee for his appearance, while the question submitter gets \$25 for each minute the panel fails to identify, to a maximum of \$100.

Alan Manning was like a bird dog on Friday, and with six or eight clever questions, kept the editor's winnings to a minimum \$25. Mr. Barris then learned from Mr. Hardman how he came to acquire the souvenir. It was during one of Sir Winston's post-war election speeches. Bob was on leave and happened to be standing by the car as Churchill was entering it. On impulse, he asked for a memento and was promptly handed the half-smoked stogie. He mailed it home to his wife, and it is carefully kept in a plastic toothbrush container.

**Interesting Agenda Set For Dairy Convention**

Some 500 dairy processors, distributors and guests will attend the annual convention of the National Dairy Council in Montreal, September 30th and October 1st. Meetings of the Council's standing committees will be held September 29th, to study trends in new and modified dairy products, research, quality control, legislation and sales promotion, and the new Board of Directors will meet October 2nd.

Canada's record milk production, expected to reach 18,000,000 lbs. this year and disposal of mounting stocks of butter, milk powder, cheese and evaporated milk will be given high priority in the discussions. Heavy surpluses also hang over the world dairy market, greatly restricting exports from this country.

Delegates will receive reports indicating a varied consumption pattern for dairy products. Optimism on the part of Council officers results from sales advances for fluid milk and cream, ice cream, evaporated milk, skim milk powder and cheese, all running at record levels to date. However, butter, which uses about one-half of the total milk supply, has shown a disturbing drop in sales while its competitor, oleomargarine, with a price advantage of some 40c per pound, is increasing at over 1,000,000 pounds a month.

Officials of the Depts. of Agriculture, Trade and Commerce and National Health and Welfare, as well as provincial dairy commissioners will take part in the deliberations. President F. J. Reynolds, Ottawa, will preside.
