Million Dollar Contract Awarded for 401 Highway

The Dept. of Highways revealed this week that tenders have been awarded two companies for grading and culverts on the stretch of Highway 401 between Highway 25 at Milton and Puslinch. As well, two bridge contracts have been let.

Forty per cent of the work is to be completed this year and finished by the summer of 1959. When the work is completed, contracts for paving will be given.

The four contracts already isued total just over a million dollars — \$1,075,631.

Peel Construction Co. Ltd. of Brampton was given the grading and culverts work between Highway 25 and the Campbellville Rd.

(Guelph Line) a distance of 4.59 miles, at a contract price of \$381,174.50.

Work on the second stretch of the road, from Campbellville to Highway 6, was given to King Paving Co. Ltd. of Oakville at a contract price of \$545,160.50. Total mileage here is 6.83 miles.

The bridge at the CPR tracks 10 miles west of Milton will be erected by Bedford Construction Co. Ltd., at a price of \$82,415. Mowbray Construction Co. Ltd. was awarded the contract, at \$66,881.75, for the structure over the Oakville Creek in Nassagaweya Township, a mile east of Campbellville.

Halton Cattle Breeders Are Prominent at C.N.E.

Tremendous classes of Ayrshires, Holsteins, and Jerseys paraded the tanbark in their respective rings at the Canadian National Exhibition, Halton exhibitors were prominent in the Holstein and Jersey shows, and at the conclusion of the first day's judging, they had reason to be proud of their achievements. Here are a few of the highlights:

Holsteins — Gordon Sinclair & Sons, of Burlington R. 1, had two red ribbons — 1st on their dry two year old heifer in a class of 42 entries, 1st on their Junior heifer calf in a class of 34 entries; 4th on their mature dry cow in a class of 30 entries.

Barbara Pickard of Oakville, R. 1, had first prize senior heifer, calf in a class of 55 entries; this heifer went on to take the reserve junior female championship.

Howard Gowland of Milton R. 1, also had a red ribbon on his two year old bull "Chico" in a class of 16, and he went on to take the reserve grand championship for males. The grand champion award was won by Spring Farm Fond Piboe, a three year old owned jointly by J. M. Fraser of Streetsville and Wilfred-Leslie of Georgetown.

Ashville Farms (Pelletterio Bros.) of Milton R. 6, had the second prize Junior bull calf; 4th prize 2 year old bull; 4th prize dry three year old; 6th prize dry 3 year old; 5th prize junior heifer calf.

Wilfrid Leslie & Sons of Georgetown R. 4, also had a third prize senior yearling heifer; A. G. Hunter of Burlington R. 6, 1, a fourth on his junior bull calf, and sixth on his junior yearling bull; Jack H. Taylor of Burlington R. 2, a fifth on his junior yearling heifer. Other Halton exhibitors who also gave a good account of themselves in this tough competition included Ward Brownridge; Arnold Fish; Clifford Hunter & Son; Ross Segsworth; P. G. Leslie; Brock Harris and Tovell Bros.

Jerseys — At the end of the first day's judging the Lindale string of Maurice C. Beaty had an imposing number of top awards these included the first prize junior get; first prize junior herd; second, fourth, fifth and eleventh prize senior yearling heifers in a class of 21 entries.

A pleasing feature of this class was the first prize award won by Ernest Alexander of Norval, whose

heifer went on to take the junior female championship, with the reserve going to M. C. Beaty's second prize heifer in the same class.

M. W. Staples, another member of the Halton Club had the second prize two year old bull, and third prize three year old bull.

In the male classes Lindale had the second prize bull calf; Featherstone Bros. of Oakville, eighth prize in the same class; Mac Alexander fifth prize senior yearling.

We almost overlooked mentioning that in a strong class of 21 junior yearling heifers Lindale Farm had second, fourth, eighth, and ninth prize awards.

The above list of awards, while not complete, should be sufficient to substantiate our statement that Halton exhibitors of Jerseys and Holsteins were prominent throughout the first day's judging at the 1958 C.N.E.

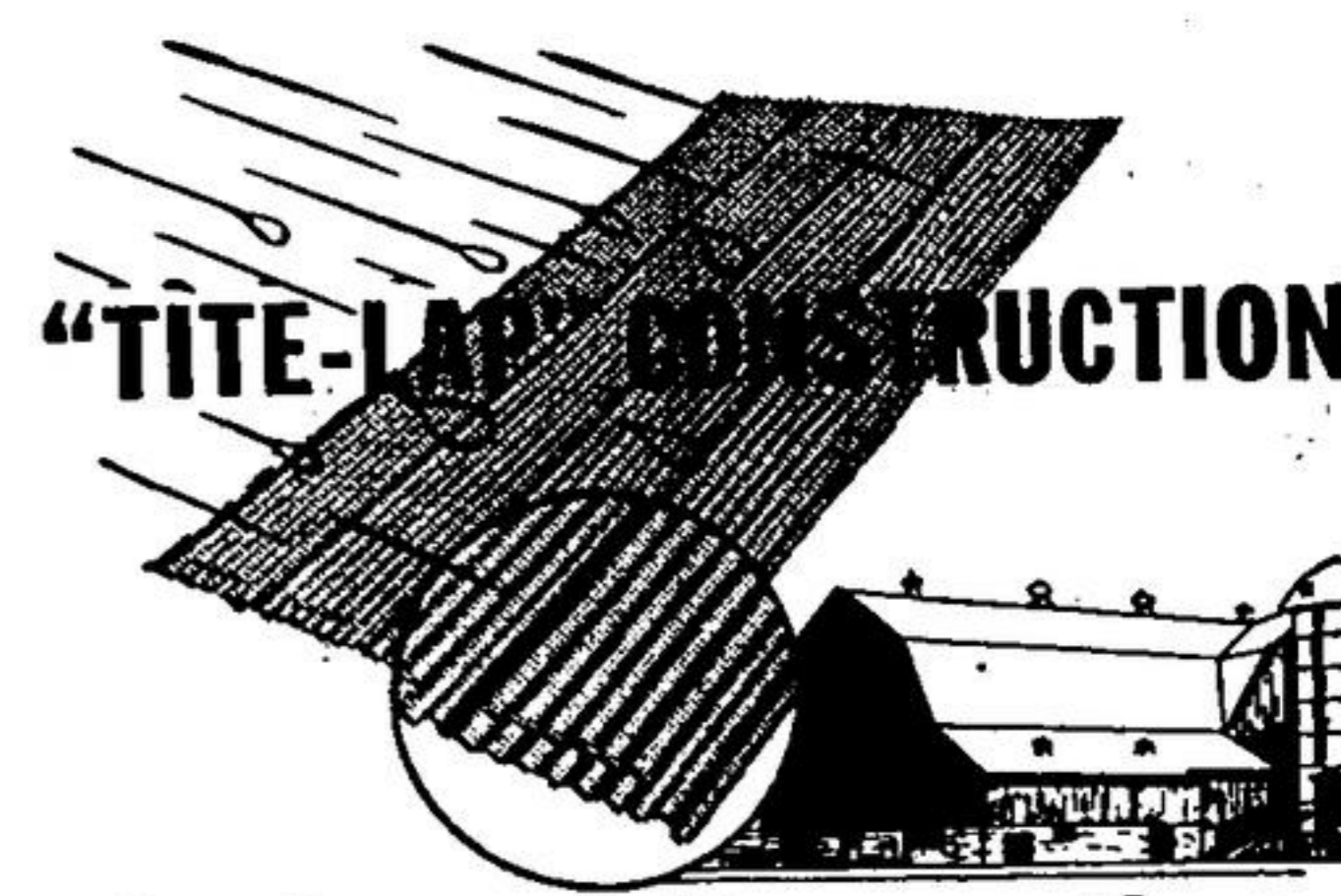


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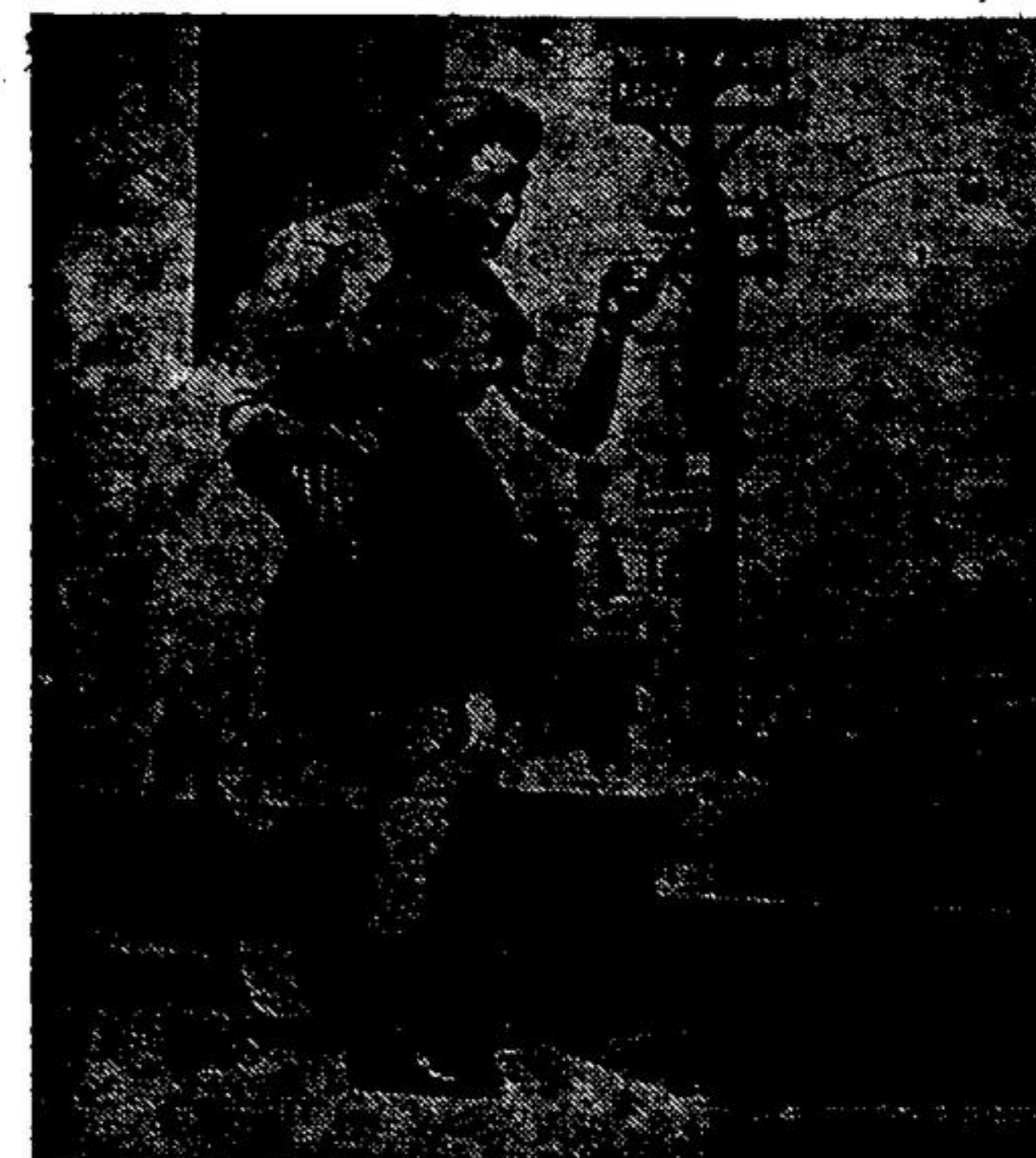
