Halton Cattle Breeders Are Prominent at C.N.E.

Tremendous classes of Ayrshires, Holsteins, and Jerseys paraded the tanbark in their respective rings at the Canadian National Exhibition, Halton exhibitors were prominent in the Hol stein and Jersey shows, and at the conclusion of the first day's judging, they had reason to proud of their achievements. Here are a few of the highlights:

Holsteins - Gordon Sinclair & Sons, of Burlington R R'1, had two red ribbons - 1st on their dry two year old heifer in a class of 42 entries, 1st on their Junior heifer calf in a class of 34 entries; 4th on their mature dry cow in a class of 30 entries.

Barbara Pickard of Oakville, R. .R. 1, had first prize senior heifer, calf in a class of 55 entries; thi heifer went on to take the reserve junior female championship.

Howard Gowland of Milton R. R. 1, also had a red ribbon on his two year old bull "Chico" in a class of 16, and he went on to take the reserve grand championship for males. The grand champion award was won by Spring Farm Fond Piebe, a three year old owned jointly by J. M. Fraserof Streetsville and Wilfred-Leslie of Georgetown.


