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RETIRED ANGLICAN BISHOP SERVED NIAGARA DIOCESE

Rt. Rev. Lewis Wilmot Bovell Broughall, 83, retired Anglican bishop of Niagara, died at the Nora Henderson Hospital in Hamilton on Saturday.

Elected the sixth bishop of Niagara in 1933, he served until his retirement in 1949.

Bishop Broughall received Doctorates of Divinity from Trinity College and Wycliffe College of the University of Toronto and an honorary Doctorate of Laws from McMaster University.

Born in Toronto, he was educated at Trinity College Schools, Port Hope and Trinity College, University of Toronto. He received his degree in 1900.

He was the son of the late Canon A. J. Broughall.

He was curate at St. James Cathedral for three years and later was curate for two years in a London church.

On his return to Canada, he became rector at All Saints Church, Hagersville. He later was rector at St. George's Church, St. Catharines.

In 1925, he became rector of Christ Church Cathedral, Hamilton, and dean of Niagara diocese. He remained in this position until his election as bishop in 1933.

The body lay in state at Christ Church Cathedral Tuesday. Service was held Wednesday morning with burial in St. James Cemetery, Toronto.

Bishop Broughall leaves one son, Wilmot of Toronto; two daughters, Mrs. Gilbert Pirie, of Hamilton and Mrs. Arthur Brain, Ottawa and four grandchildren. His wife, Sophia Margaret Hagarty predeceased him.

Publish New Canada Natural Resource Map

A new natural resources map of Canada, designed primarily for use in schools, has been issued by the Dept. of Mines and Technical Surveys. The seven colour map shows in simplified form mineral, agricultural, forest, fish, fur and water power resources as well as principal communities and rail lines on a province to province basis.

The nickel and iron belts of northern Quebec and Labrador, the iron area on Baffin Island, and the railway line to the iron-ore development at Schefferville are shown on the map, which is on the scale of 100 miles to the inch.

The first edition of the natural resources map was issued in 1930. This and subsequent editions in 1936, 1944 and 1950, included the Arctic Islands only as far north as Devon Island. The present map shows the resources of Canada to the northernmost tip of Ellesmere Island.

For the first time the extent of the fishing banks off the Atlantic provinces including the Grand Banks, is outlined by the 50 and 100 Fathom lines.

Agricultural areas and forest information have been presented in a different way. Some settled portions of Ontario and Quebec formerly described as mixed farming areas, are now denoted as livestock and dairying regions. The practice of dividing the country into forest areas has been discontinued and in its place, various colors are used to show forest species. Arctic and alpine tundra are also shown in colour.

The map was prepared by the Map Compilation and Reproduction Division, Surveys and Mapping branch, in cooperation with several federal departments. Material supplied for the new Atlas of Canada, which is being prepared by the Dept. for release some time this autumn, was used in compiling the new resources map.

Cost of the map is 25 cents. Schools may obtain a free copy from the Map Distribution Office, Dept. of Mines and Technical Surveys, Ottawa.
