went to Cornwall to witness the ceremonies which bring a huge new source of power from the International Rapids. Climaxing the celebrations, Hon. Leslie M. Frost, Ontario premier and Averill Harriman, New York state governor, jointly started generators housed in the two power-houses and sent power, pulsing through the facilities of the partners in the endeavour. Ontario Hydro and the Power Authority of

Among speakers were Hon. Thomas Dewey, former New York governor; James S. The power project, when completed in 1959, will have 32 generating units with a maximum capacity of 1,880,000 kilowatts.
