**Hydro Commission,
Halton M.P.P. At
Power Project Opening**

Members of the local hydro commission and their wives were among those attending the opening on Friday of the St. Lawrence Power project, a joint effort of the province of Ontario and the state of New York.

Mayor and Mrs. Jack Armstrong, Mr. and Mrs. Graham Farnell and Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Binkley went to Cornwall to witness the colourful ceremonies which bring a huge new source of power from the International Rapids.

Climaxing the celebrations, Hon. Leslie M. Frost, Ontario premier and Averill Harriman, New York state governor, jointly started generators housed in the two power-houses and sent power pulsing through the facilities of the partners in the endeavour, Ontario Hydro and the Power Authority of the State of New York.

Also present as a member of the Ontario government, was Mr. Stanley Hall and Mrs. Hall, Mr. Hall accompanied other members of the Legislature who were guests at the opening.

Among speakers were Hon. Thomas Dewey, former New York governor; James S. Duncan, chairman of Ontario Hydro, and Robert Moses, New York Authority chairman. A highlight of the day was the premiere of the St. Lawrence Suite, a new composition by famous composer Morton Gould, who directed the band of the Royal Canadian Ordnance Corps.

The power project, when completed in 1959, will have 32 generating units with a maximum capacity of 1,800,000 kilowatts.
