Three Academic Courses Offered at Night School

Included among night school courses this fall are three academic subjects of Grade XII, Algebra, Chemistry or Physics, and English. These will run for twenty nights and standing towards Junior Matriculation may be granted if student's work is satisfactory. Typing also will be given twenty nights. The fee for the twenty night courses is \$7. A non-academic course for the regular twelve nights will be Conversational French. Members of the high school staff will teach the above courses.

A new course offered for the first time is Wood Carving and Clay Modelling. Instruction will cover elementary Wood Carving including small figures and possibly trays and bowls. Some modelling in clay may be done if desired by the class. The teacher is Miss Rebecca Sisler who will soon be making her home at Terra Cotta. Miss Sisler attended the Ontario College of Art, the Danish Academy of Fine Arts, Copenhagen, and taught for two years at the John Madsen Folk School, Unionville. She is now secretary of the Sculpture School of Canada. She works in wood, stone, and terra cotta and one of her stone carvings was displayed at the CNE Art Gallery this year.

Choral singing, led by Kenneth R. Harrison, ARCT, RMT, music teacher in the local schools, will give an insight into the fields of standard and modern repertoire. It will consist of a variety program in singing, the choice of music depending upon the wish of the majority of the students.

The course in Industrial Drafting will be directed by Leonard Wilson, AMEE, 10 Brucewood Dr., who has been closely connected with general engineering and production tool design for many years. Formerly of Toronto where he instructed similar evening classes at Western Tech, Mr. Wilson holds a responsible position in Production Engineering at Orenda Engines, Malton.

A Handyman Course for men and women which will cover minor repairs in the home will be taught by Fred J. Armstrong of the Check Line, who is well-known locally as a veritable Mr. Fix-It. Students will be encouraged to bring their problems to class for discussion.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

UNION, TOWN AGREE ON CONTRACT DATE

With the newly-formed Local 79, National Union of Public Service Employees accepting March 31st as the starting date for a contract, council on Monday voted to accept the contract which has been delayed because a majority of councillors did not like the previous Dec. 31st date.

A by-law is being prepared which will be signed by the mayor and clerk for the town.

Mayor Armstrong brought up the question of a company which he had heard had rented the arena for an auction sale of commodities which are sold by local stores. The town will derive no revenue from this, other than the arena rent, he said, and he was interested in seeing that the town should obtain the maximum fee allowable, in order to discourage this as much as possible.

The town, he believes, has a by-law covering this, but it could not be found in the records.

Council issued instructions to have such a by-law prepared. (Yesterday, a further search of town records revealed a 1934 by-law which requires a \$250 fee for such an operation.)
