

> While, with a few exceptions, many of them are unknown out side of their immediate area there were 246 rural fairs held in Ontario last year and it is gratifying that 70 per cent of them had an increase in exhibitors and 66 per cent had higher gate receipts than in the previous year. play an increasingly important part in the social and economic life of the province.

In addition to providing a "show window" where agricultural machinery and the latest advances in husbandry can be demonstrated, the Ontario Fall Fair continues to play an important part in fostering a better understanding between the rural and urban resi dents of the province. Through exhibits and demonstrations a better understanding of the problems of the farm is brought home to the urban dweller. In turn, some insight into the complexities of urban life is given the farmer. This cannot do other than lead to a better appreciation of each other's problems and work to the advantage of both segments of the population.

It was not long after the first settlement of Ontario that the country fair made its appearance. Settlement in Ontario commenced in 1783 and in 1792 had progressed sufficiently along the Niagara River and peninsula to justify the formation of an agricultural society and the holding of the first fair in Ontario.

This pioneer society had its headquarters at Niagara-on-the-Lake, then known as Newark, and had as its distinguished president, Governor Simcoe.
