**Isaac M. Bennett Was
25 Years Esqueuing Clerk**

Esqueuing Township clerk for 25 years, Isaac Melvin Bennett, 79 died at his home, 59 Edith St. on September 18th. He had been in failing health for some time.

Born in Esqueuing Township July 5th, 1879, he was the youngest and last surviving member of a family of twelve of the late Thomas Bennett and Mary Zimmerman. For many years he farmed on the old homestead, and after his first marriage to Annie Ruddell of Ashgrove, moved to a farm on the 7th Line below Ballinafad. They had one daughter, Noroon (Mrs. William Corley).

Thirty years ago this fall he married Emma Cook of Ballinafad and since then they had made their home in Georgetown. Four years ago he retired from his position as township clerk.

He was an active member of St. John's United Church, and for many years was an elder. He was a man who loved his church, his community and his friends.

Surviving are his wife and daughter, and four grandchildren.

The funeral service was conducted in St. John's Church on Thursday by a former pastor, Rev. R. C. Todd of Niagara Falls. Mrs. Gordon Kidney, a cousin, sang "The City Four Square" during the service. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.
