Two Georgetown High School graduates who enrolled at McMaster University on Monday have been awarded Atkinson Foundation bursaries.

Recipients of the bursaries, which come from the estate of Joseph Atkinson, late publisher of the Toronto Daily Star, are William Cohoon, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Cohoon, bimehouse, and Douglas Wrigglesworth, son of Mrs. Howard Wrigglesworth, 20 James St., and the late Mr. Wrigglesworth. His father was principal of Chapel St. public school at the time of his death, and Georgetown's second public school was named in his memory.

Both young men have enrolled in the Honour Science course at McMaster. The \$400 yearly bursaries are renewable each year if scholastic standing is maintained.
