CLUB MIDTOWN

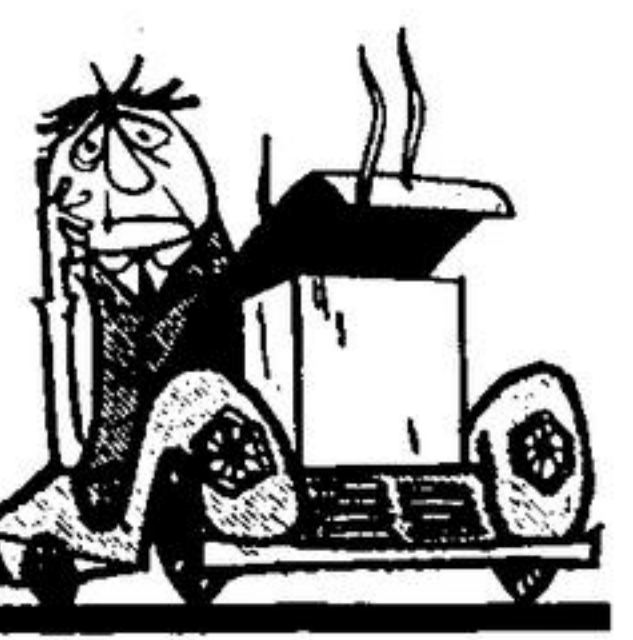
Good evening, friends. And now for the Midtown highlights.
