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Property Fenced, Shows New Cemetery Limits

Addition of a wire fence continues an improvement policy which has kept Georgetown's Greenwood Cemetery one of the most beautiful in the country.

The eight foot Frost link fence was installed recently by Cecil Smith, and encompasses the older part of Greenwood and a newer section purchased last year.

The Cemetery Board, a council-appointed group, while little publicized, has an important function in the community and fulfills it well. The board lost its chairman recently in the death of Everett Cole, for whom no replacement has yet been named by council. 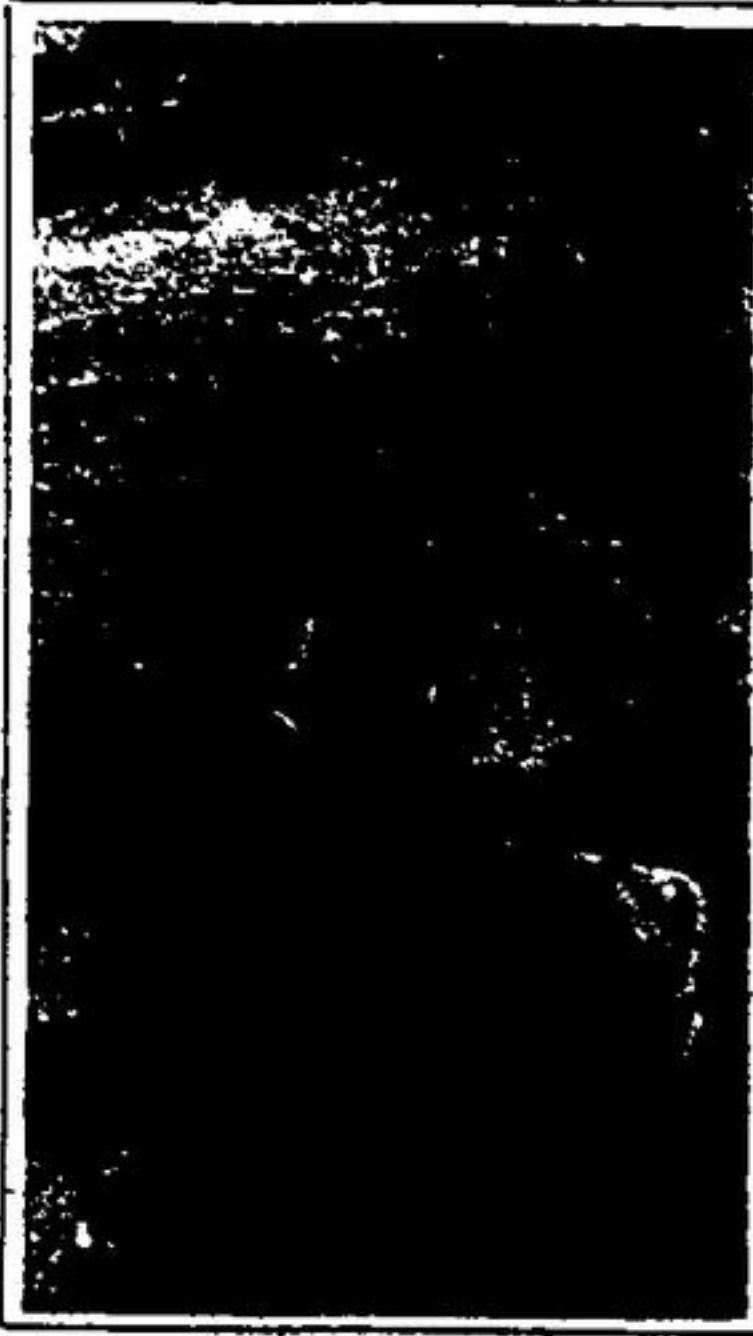
