

#### WEED CONTROL **NEWS**

RECREATION AREAS Numerous parks are now being established in Halton county, of which all but one are being developed and maintained by the local municipalities. They are sometimes called recreation areas, the word "recreation" being derived from "recreate." Residents and visitors patronize such places primarily to have a rost or a change or to put it plainly to "recreate" something with which is seemingly lost in the ordinary humdrum of daily living.

Therefore a park is a place where we expect to see something of beauty. Nothing is more detrimental to the appearance of our parks than areas heavily infested with unsightly floxious weeds. Every effort should, therefore, .be made by the governing parks authorities to destroy weeds and keep thier properties neat and ti-

In order to accomplish this task grounds should be planned so that as much of the area as possible can be easily mown mechanically. Sections where this is impossible should be sprayed with a chemical weed killer at the proper time of year. This practice will eliminate the necessity of considerable hand cutting. Of course care must be taken to prevent weeds from ripening seeds. However, wherever these undesirable plants persist excellent results may be obtained by spraying with 2, 4D wherever practical.

Many of our parks have been maintained in excellent condition this summer in regard to weed control. Unfortunately, however there is evidence that others have been somewhat neglected. The residents in the local municipalities are somewhat to blame their parks do not measure up. If you really want the parkland in your area to be one of the finest in Halton county don't be afraid to approach the local park auth-


