FARM NEWS

Urges Organization Control Elm Disease

Dutch elm tree disease has definitely been found in Halton county — not once, but in several locations. To lose all our stately elms is unthinkable. Unfortunately, as yet, there is no cure for the disease once a tree is attacked; and the disease can only be identified by a laboratory test. Material from suspected elm trees should be sent to the Forest Pathology Laboratory at Maple.

As pointed out by W. E. Steele, Reforestation supervisor at Hespefer, Ont. Although elms are a forest tree, the disease attacks those growing in the open, around fence rows, streets and parks, in preference to forest trees. If our rural and urban municipalities wish to save the elms in the various parks, and streets, action must be taken to protect the healthy elms before they are attacked. The disease is transmitted by the Elm Bark Beetle. This involves spraying with an insecticide such as DDT in an oil emulsion. It also involves a sprayer with the ability to cast the insecticide fifty to seventy five feet in the air, so that the taller elms may be covered.

According to Mr. Steele, the most economical and efficient type of sprayer appears to be a mist blower. The city of Hamilton purchased five of these big and powerful mist blowers a year ago, in order that they might protect their healthy elms. This is not a problem which the individual property owner can solve. Consequently we can't help but wonder if this is not a problem requiring the joint action of our Municipal Councils and Park Committees. Surely a progressive county like Halton can afford at least one of these powerful mist blowers to protect the elm trees in our parks, both urban and rural. Perhaps our two Conservation Authorities might participate in such a programme.

We hope that no one will conclude that we are posing as an authority on the subject but we do think the matter is worthy of consideration in the immediate future. If you, Mr. or Mrs. Reader thinks that the idea has any merit, why not sow a little seed where it will bear fruit.
