Typing and the academic courses (Algebra, Chemistry, Physics, English) will consist of twenty classes, Oct. 21 and 22 - Dec. 9 and 10, Jan. 13 and 14 - March 31, April 1. The total fee for these courses will be \$7.00.

Square Dancing: total fee \$15 per couple. \$10. single. Welding: total fee: \$15. Chess: A small additional fee may be charged.

If an applicant is unable to attend a class for which he has registered, his initial fee of \$2.00 will be refunded if he notifies the application secretary before Oct. 17th.

In all instances students will pay for costs of materials, and the necessary tools.

A minimum of 15 applicants must apply for each class. Applicants must be 16 years of age or over. The committee reserves the right to carry or cancel any class.
