## Doughnut Salesman Train Crash Victim

A Guelph doughnut salesman, Richard F. Jones, 71, who was well known by a number of local merchants, was fatally injured when the truck he was driving was involved in a level crossing accident. The accident occurred on No. 32 sideroad, Chinguacousy township, 11 miles northwest of Brampton.

Police report that the light delivery truck driven by Mr. Jones collided with a CPR passenger train, and was thrown 81 feet from the crossing. The motor was found 200 feet away. A salesman for Bob's HoniDip Doughnuts, Mr. Jones, at the time of the accident, was returning to Guelph.

He was rushed to Peel Memorial Hospital where he died an hour after the crash. The train was delayed more than an hour while workmen pried the front of the damaged engine from the ties.

Born in Guelph, Mr. Jones had resided here all his life. He attended the Church of Our Lady and was a former member of Knights of Columbus.

Surviving are his wife, the former Catherine McAteer, three sons and four daughters, Richard of Toronto, John, Guelph, Clayton, R. R. 1, Puslinch; Mrs. James Beynon (Alice) of Barry Sound, Mrs. Albert Brooks (Dorothy) of Guelph; Miss Audrey Jones, Toronto and Sister Elizabeth (Verna) of the St. Joseph's sisters, Prince Rupert, B.C. Also surviving are two brothers and one sister John, Guelph; Arthur, Toronto and Mrs. Albert Nicholson (Grace), of Durham. There are 15 grandchildren.

#### FARMER'S GIFT SAVES HIM TAX

A recent release from Ottawa, indicates that a farmer who legally transfers a share of his farm to his wife or one of his children for farming purposes, can now claim a maximum exemption from taxation of \$10,000 on that share. Such a deduction may be claimed only once by a donor according to the report. The maximum exemption was previously \$4,000. This increase in tax exemption came about through an amendment of the Income Tax Act.

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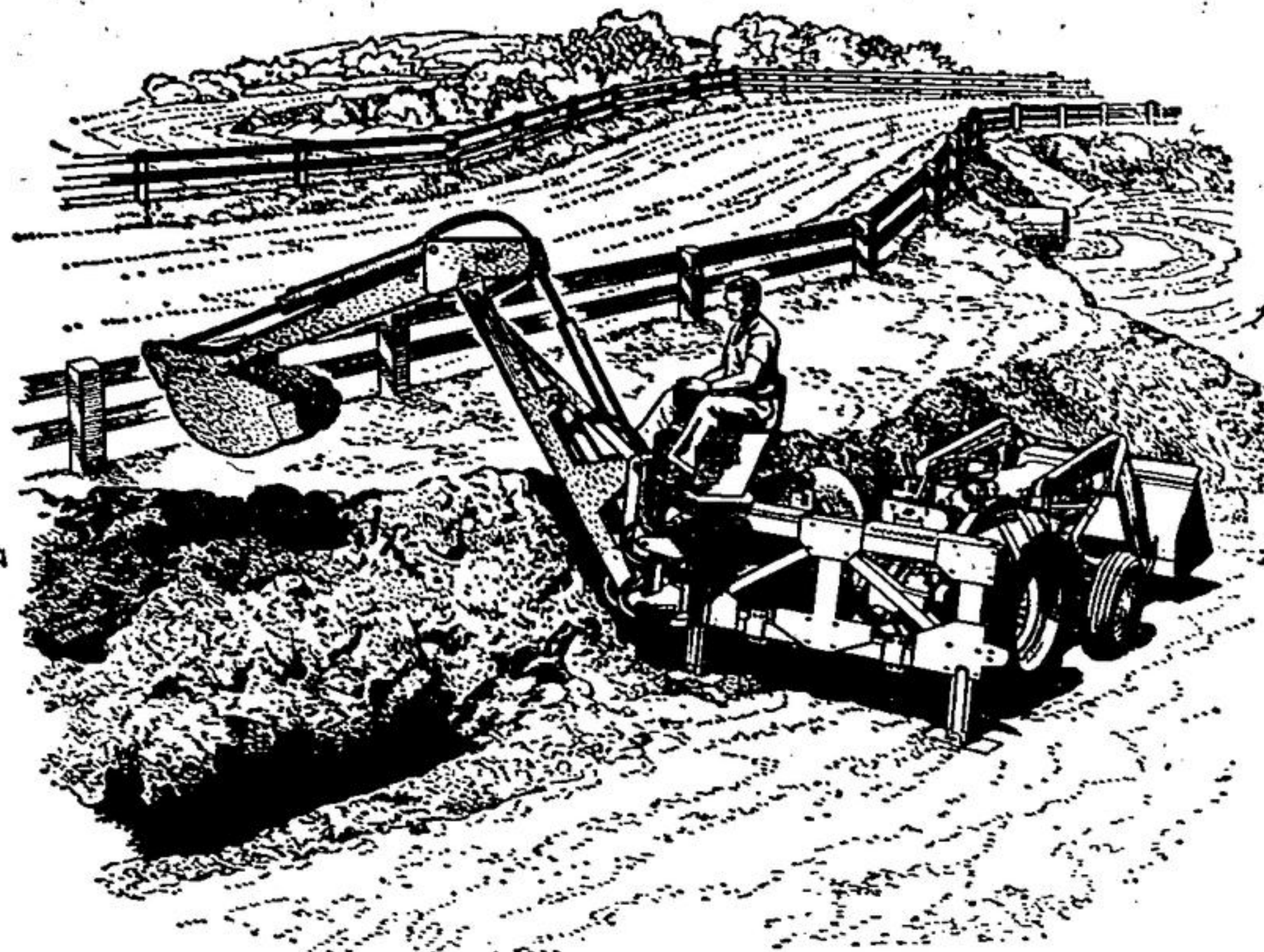
