## Perfect Weather, Large Crowd Make Fall Fair Another Big Success

### En Route Home for Week-End David Barber Accident Victim

As the result of an accident on No. 400 Highway, Saturday, David Alan Barber, died at the age of twenty-five. David, who was a tender on a diving job with the Ralphen Company, Pembroke, was returning home for the week-end with two fellow workers when his car went off the road and turned over in the ditch. Deane Doucett of Montreal suffered a fractured back and Harry Smith of Toronto only suffered a few scratches. They were thrown out of the car when it overturned. The cause of the accident is unknown. David was born in Toronto and came to Georgetown in 1939 with his family and he attended Georgetown public and high schools, leaving them to enter the Navy in 1951 where he served until 1956. While in the Navy he became the light middleweight boxing champion for the eastern Atlantic Command. He was a member of the Norval ball club this year and played hockey for the Provincial mill in the industrial league last winter. He was a member of St. George's Anglican Church.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Barber Sr., and three brothers, George, Paul and John. Rev. Kenneth Richardson conducted the funeral service at the Harold C. McClure funeral home, 34 Edith St., Georgetown, on Monday at three o'clock. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were Tom Barber, Jim Ford, Bert Carey, George McClure, Don Ford and a friend from the navy, George Thompson of Toronto.

Mr. Best congratulated the organization on a job well done, and expressed his pleasure in the community spirit which a fall fair engenders, both among rural and urban residents.

Vince Mountford, Brampton, was emcee and kept grandstand spectators informed of the program as races and livestock judging took place during the afternoon. The midway, larger than Georgetown Fair has seen in the past, was well patronized and a continual flow of spectators thronged the exhibit hall to see displays which included domestic science and handicrafts, flowers, grain and vegetables, school exhibits and displays by Institutes and 4H groups. The hall, drew particularly favourable comment this year for both quantity and quality of exhibits. There was a noticeable increase particularly in the flower show and vegetable classes.

An estimated 6,000 people attended the fair, close to a record crowd.

## TOWN POPULATION NOW 8222 25 PER CENT. CLIMB IN YEAR

A 25 per cent increase in population in the past year was noted when Assessment Commissioner Joseph Gibbons presented statistics to council on Monday.

Georgetown's population, as of September 30th, was 8222. Mr. Gibbons reported. A year previous, this figure was 6578. Assessment has increased in almost direct proportion to population.

Total 1958 assessment is \$11,319,550, a 23.6 increase from last year. Breaking down the apportionment of assessment, Mr. Gibbons revealed this as industrial 13.40% (15.52%), residential 13.40% (13.57%), commercial 14.16% (70.81%) and farm 0.1% (10%). Figures in brackets are the 1957 ones.

### Trucks Demolished, Man Injured in High-y Smash

Two men were injured, two trucks almost demolished and a car damaged in an accident on Guelph Street Friday morning at 8:15 a.m. It took place at the Sinclair Ave. and highway intersection.

Most seriously injured was Ed Lee, 36 College St. who was taken to hospital in Guelph for treatment of fractured ribs and a lacerated forehead. He was able to return home on the week-end and is recuperating there.

The accident involved a westbound car driven by John Algeo, Alderwood, Mr. Lee's truck, also westbound, and an eastbound truck driven by Leonard Bessey, St. Catharines. Mr. Bessey received a severe shaking up and required medical attention at the scene.

While the Algeo car received about \$250 damage, the trucks were almost a total loss according to police estimates with combined damage amounting to \$10,000. Cst. Frank Dennis was the investigating officer.

#### WHAT COUNCIL DID

### Council Business Light At Last Monday's Session

One of council's lighter sessions took place on October 6th, when a large share of the meeting was spent in reading and passing a number of by-laws for sewer and waterline installation. Reeve Doug Sargent presided, with Mayor Armstrong-absent for a portion of the meeting while he spoke at a Home and School meeting.

Asking about plans for an outdoor skating rink this season on a vacant lot at the Edward - Byron corner, Sid Hardie's request was turned over to the property committee for action. Asking if there could be some form of supervision at the rink, Mr. Harrison suggested that a ratepayer in the area might volunteer to do this.

Bernard Cassell, asking about progress on roads and ditches in the Sunbeam Heights area was told by road chairman Walter Gray that this, and surfacing of Delrex roads will probably not be possible this fall, as the Dept. of Highways does not recommend paving so late in the year. The roads will be maintained and dust controlled as much as possible, he said, until paving in the spring.

Cr. Harrison pointed out that the subdivider must take the blame for roads not being paved as he had not put the roads in shape in sufficient time to allow this.

Mr. Cassell said he hoped there would be no delay in the spring. Ratepayers do not mind waiting when they know they must, but they don't like to be told a job

will be done and then have it delayed.

A letter from Main St. merchant Jack Cotton thanked council for consideration of a letter he had sent recently about parking in the downtown area. He suggested council and Chamber of Commerce representatives meet to discuss the problem.

Council decided to turn the letter over to the Chamber as they had done with previous correspondence, and empowered the property committee to work with that organization in arranging for signs indicating the free parking area.

Opening four tenders for purchase of the town bulldozer, council delayed decision on accepting the highest tender, one from Bob Lane for \$4700 until an appraisal is made of the machine.

A letter from the district municipal engineer, Dept. of Highways, indicated his department would now okay several roads in the Delrex subdivision for subsidy purposes.
