New Coater Will Be Largest in Canada

A recent announcement by D. S. Abbott, president of Howard Smith Paper Mills and its subsidiary company, Alliance Paper Mills, revealed that an expansion programme is to begin at the Georgetown Division of Alliance Paper Mills Ltd. In addition to the present project, the new programme includes a new wide paper coater, wide finishing machines, a new steam plant, and buildings for raw material storage as well as finished product. The productive capacity of the Coating Mill will thus be increased to a point where it will have sufficient reserve to take care of the growing demands for its products. Completion of this new addition is scheduled for the end of 1959.

The vice president and general manager of Alliance Paper Mills, S. J. Quattrocchi, stated that this new move clearly expressed the Company's interest and confidence in the Georgetown district, and the Coating Mill which has been in continuous operation since 1912. The new Coating Machine is to be the largest in Canada, coating paper at speeds up to 1,000 feet a minute (12 miles per hour.) It will satisfy the demand for the larger sheets becoming increasingly popular with printers and lithographers.

To finish the wide web of paper coming from the new machine, a supercalender, which smooths and polishes the raw coated stock, is being installed, as well as a wide cutter to reduce the rolls to sheets. New demands for

steam will be met by the installation of a new steam generator. An extension to the present buildings will provide space for storage, as mentioned above.

The original Coating Mill was built in 1912 and operated as the Georgetown Coating Mills until purchased in 1928 by the then newly formed Alliance Paper Mills. In 1929 Howard Smith Paper Mills purchased Alliance, and it has been an operating subsidiary ever since. Over the years, the Georgetown mill has expanded on numerous occasions. The present project is of considerable significance to the Georgetown district, and the large paper using centres, and it will be a worthwhile contribution to the industrial development of the area.

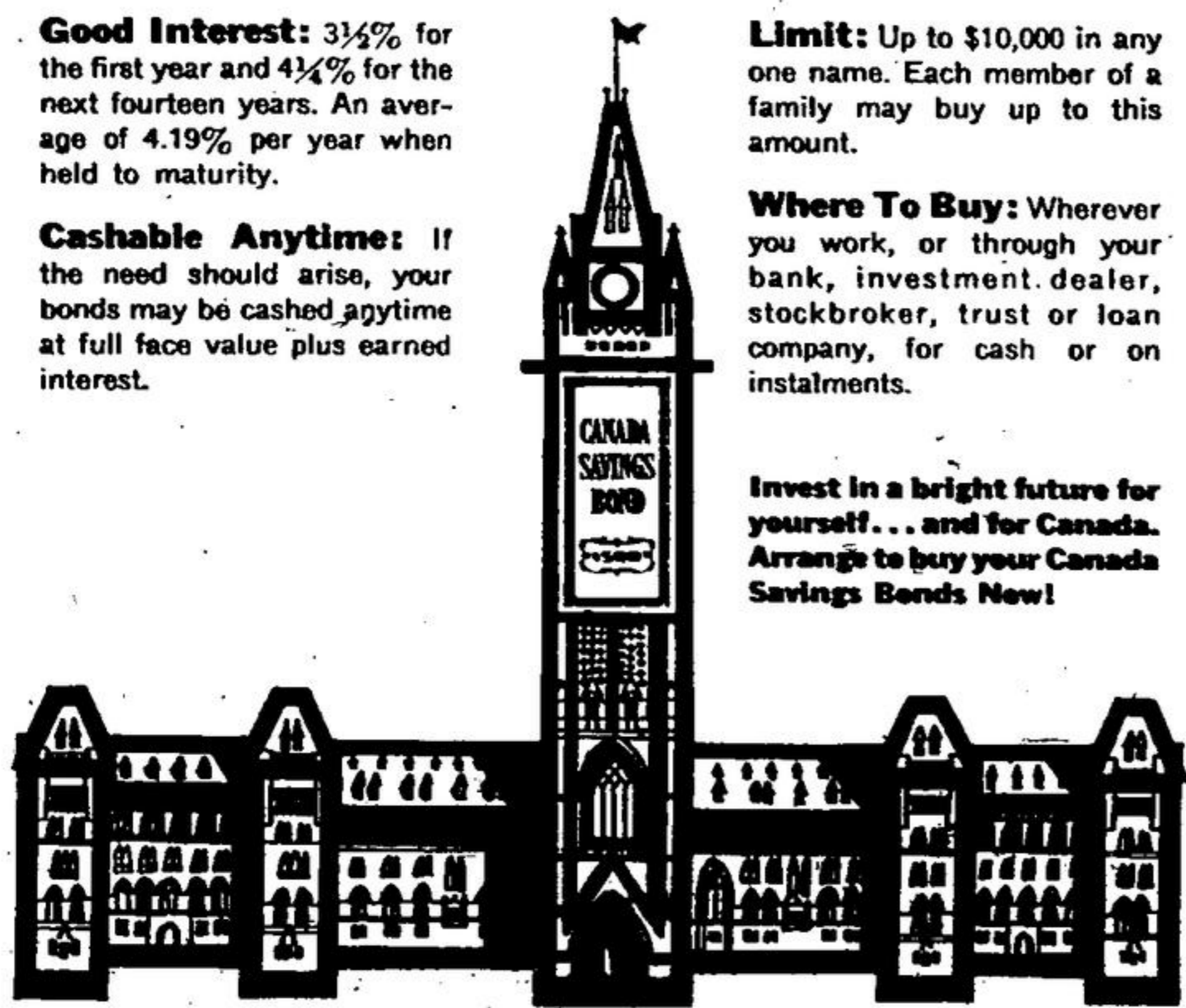
