Harrison School Wins Legion Trophy, 4-School Field Meet

With four schools competing, athletes from Harrison Public racked up an impressive total of 92 points to win the championship last Thursday at a track and field meet held in Georgetown Park.

Harrison easily outclassed their closest rival, Wrigglesworth, which last year was only half a point behind. This year, Wrigglesworth had 43 points, Chapel Street 23 and the new Park Public School 22. The winner retained possession of the trophy which is presented by Legion Branch 120.

The point system was used in assessing standings with 5 points awarded to first place, 3 to second and 1 to third. One contestant was allowed to enter only two events plus a relay race.

Besides winning the championship, Harrison swept the field in individual awards. Barry Harvey and Betty Quackenbush were senior champions, each with the highest possible total of 15 points. Bruce Grimsey and Leslie Quackenbush each had 13 points to win intermediate honours.
