FAVOUR SINGLE FLOOR PLAN FOR NEW GEORGETOWN HOSPITAL

Georgetown's hospital is a step nearer to realization as the result of plans submitted by architects to the Hospital Association recently.

At this meeting, John Langley, representing the firm of Govan, Lindsay, Ferguson, Kamiaker, Langley and Keenleyside of Toronto presented two different plans, a one-storey structure and a two-storey.

Those present included the chairman of the building committee, Ted Evans, Denney Charles, who is a director; Doctors A. E. Macintosh, J. H. Chamberlain and C. A. Thompson, representing the medical profession; Miss Betty McNeil, district health nurse; John Gunn, chairman of the hospital board; Mrs. Lloyd Marks, board secretary; Mr. Langley; Mr. Taylor Morrow of Gordon A. Frican

Associates, Toronto, Dr. Hoyle Campbell, Toronto, and Ed Peters, publicity.

Dr. Campbell outlined what he considers the essentials to layout and furnishings to provide hospitalization efficiently and at the least cost.

Most of the board members favoured the single floor plan and Dr. Campbell felt that with some modification in layout, it should be suitable for requirements here. He expressed the opinion that, starting with an initial building of 65 or 70 beds, it might be necessary to add to the structure to take 150 beds within 3 years and possibly to nearly 600 beds within ten or fifteen years.

The board will soon be meeting to consider the revised plan when it is submitted.

Rev. Arthur Leggett Now at Uptergrove

Former minister at Norval and Union Presbyterian churches, Rev. Arthur Leggett, recently ended a 7-year pastorate at Arthur to go to Uptergrove, near Orillia.

Mr. Leggett lived in Norval from 1939 to 1943, being succeeded here by Rev. Leonard Self, now of Mississauga, and later by the present minister, Rev. G. L. Royal. A graduate of the Presbyterian Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky, he was minister at Molesworth and Gorrie prior to Norval. He served in Beaufort, Quebec, from 1943 to 1948, then was on the staff of Vancouver Bible College until going to Arthur in 1951. He also had a church at Gordonville.

Mr. Leggett's wife died in 1952, and he remarried last year. A large congregation was present in St. Andrew's Church to hear his farewell address to his people in Arthur.

The title of his sermon was "The Golden Book of Heaven", and the text "There shall enter into the city neither they that defileth - but they which are written in the Lamb's Book of Life." He pointed out that the "Book of Life" is mentioned again in the Bible, beginning with Moses, and in the Book of Revelation there are at least seven references to it. The preacher reminded his hearers that God had a perfect record of the life of every person. According to the Bible no one could enter Heaven on the basis or merits of his own conduct. In an impressive way, the preacher exhorted people: "Be sure your names are written in the Lamb's Book of Life, and then, if we never meet again on earth, we shall meet in Heaven."

A message was read from Rev. Clarkson Smith of the United Church, expressing for himself and his congregation their appreciation of the work in the town and community of the Rev. Arthur Leggett, during the seven years of his ministry.

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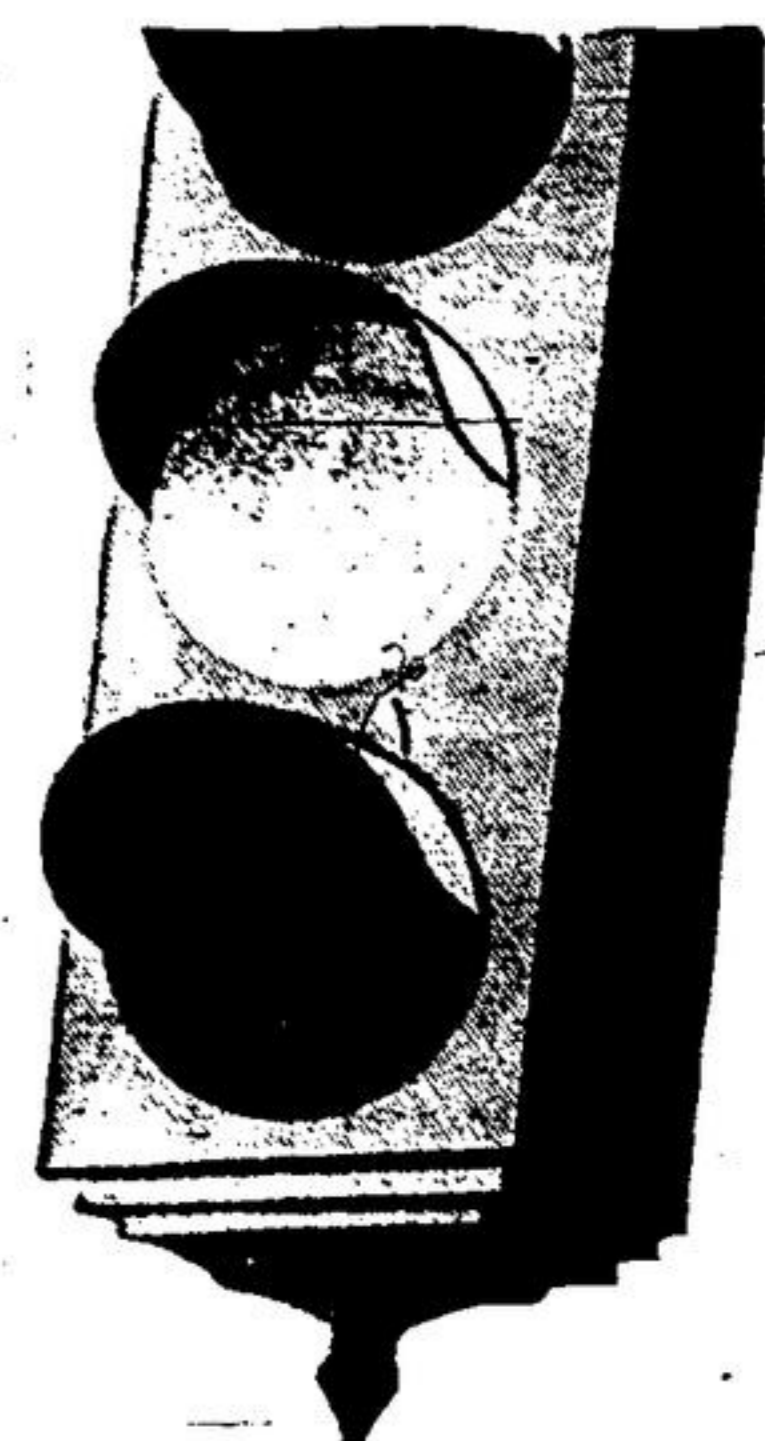
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
