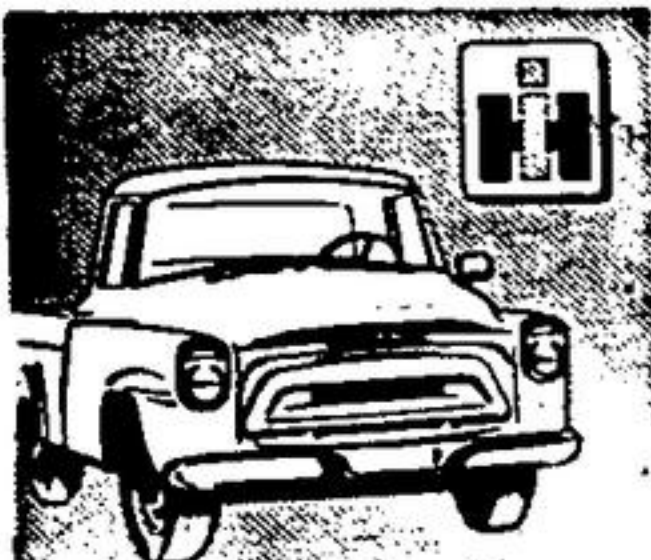

Mayor Reviews Georgetown's History at School Meeting

The fall meeting of the Harrison Home and School association was held on Monday, October 2nd at Harrison Public School and saw a good turnout of newcomers with several new members being signed. Mayor Jack Armstrong was the first speaker of the new term and spoke on his boyhood days in Georgetown and took the opportunity to review the town's history before some of its newest citizens.

The mayor illustrated his talk with photos taken by Charles Trotter, pointing out that the town was formerly known as Hungry Hollow but was later changed to Georgetown, possibly after the first settler George Kennedy who arrived here in 1820. The town was incorporated in 1922 as a town.

The mayor also took part in the meeting by presenting two citizenship award cups to 2 grade eight students judged to have contributed most to their class last year. Four girls and four boys from grade eight nominated the top girl and boy and the nominations were approved unanimously by the teachers. Pamela Sullivan and Ian Ferguson

were on hand to accept the awards. A table of folders on child care and education was displayed by Mrs. R. Heathering who is the pamphlet distributor and Mrs. John Easdale served coffee and cookies in the hall after the meeting.

The next meeting will be held at the school on Monday, Nov. 5, a half an hour earlier, at 7:30 p.m., and will be "meet the teacher" night. The teachers will outline the program of work for the year and the expected conduct, homework, etc. The parents will be informed of the number in their child's classroom but will be given no personal interviews. Talks by the teachers will outline the work in each particular grade, each teacher in her own room, and the parents will be rotated to another classroom when the bell rings.

The Georgetown boys band will be seen and heard at Chapel St. School on Monday evening, Oct. 7th, giving parents a chance to meet the bandmaster, Alfred Perrott, and have their sons try out for the band. Instruments may be rented and the bandmaster will explain the scheme.
