

## Euchre Club, Hobby Class New Activities at Manor

A meeting to organize a euchre club, the first regular meeting of the Hobby Class for the current season, the first church service of the season and an eagerly anticipated band concert occurred at the Manor recently.

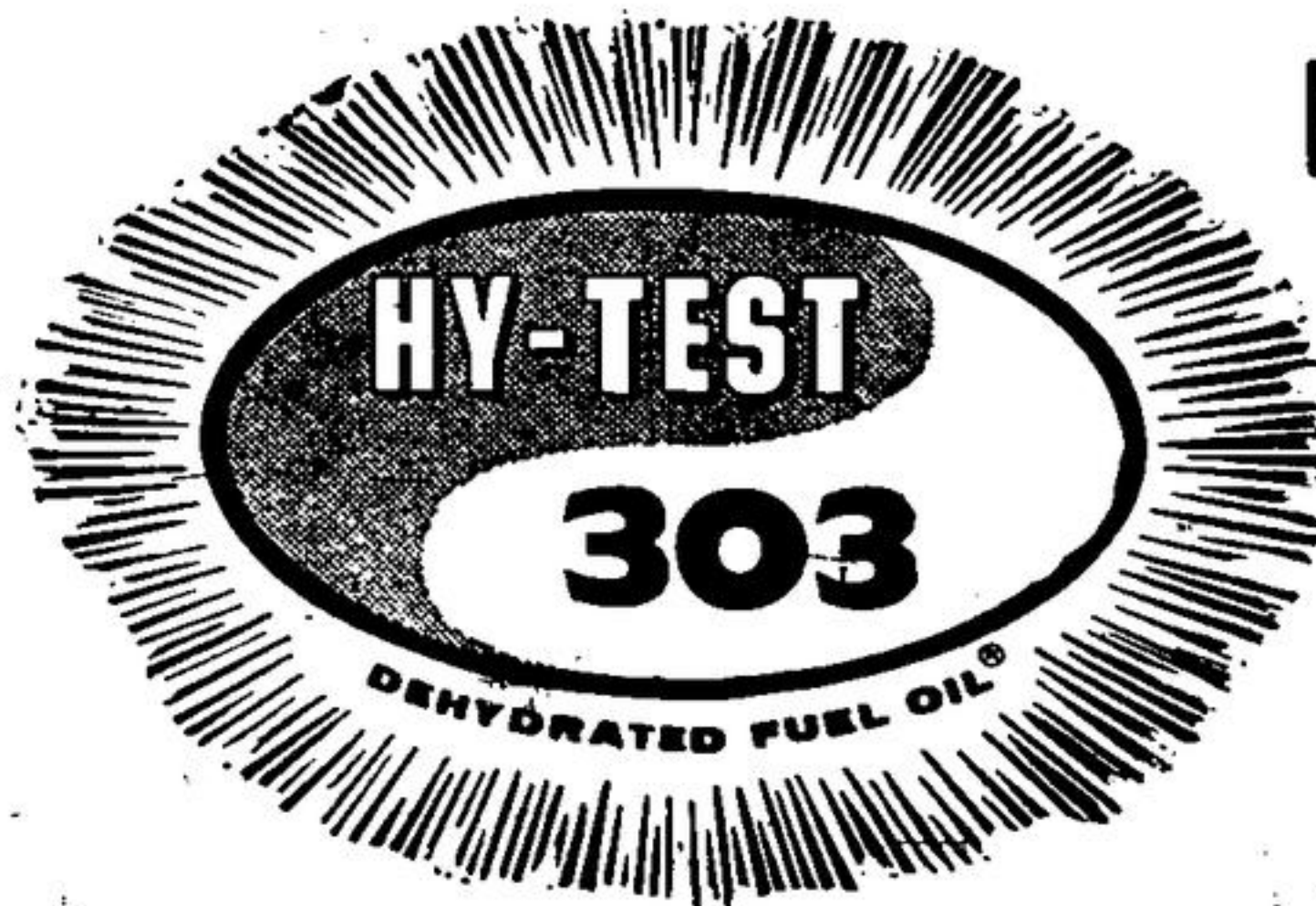
