He was overseas for five years during World War II with the Royal Canadian Ordnance Corps and presently commands 4 Ordnance Company in Hamilton, a militia unit. He is also a member of the board of managers of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Ancaster.

REV. CHARLES CARPENTER DIES AT RICHMOND HILL

Rev. Charles Carpenter, rector emeritus of St. Leonard's Anglican Church, Richmond Hill, died on October 9, after a brief illness.

Mr. Carpenter's son Walter now a professor at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, was principal of Georgetown High School during the war years while the army overseas.

He leaves his wife, a daughter Mildred of Toronto, and three sons, Harold of Toronto, Walter of Guelph and Lieut. Colonel George Carpenter of Ottawa.

Funeral service was held on Saturday morning in St. Leonard's Church and interment followed in St. James Cemetery.

With Remembrance Day almost upon us, we trust each and every member will see fit to parade on that day. This is always a large parade, and let's hope it stays that way this year.

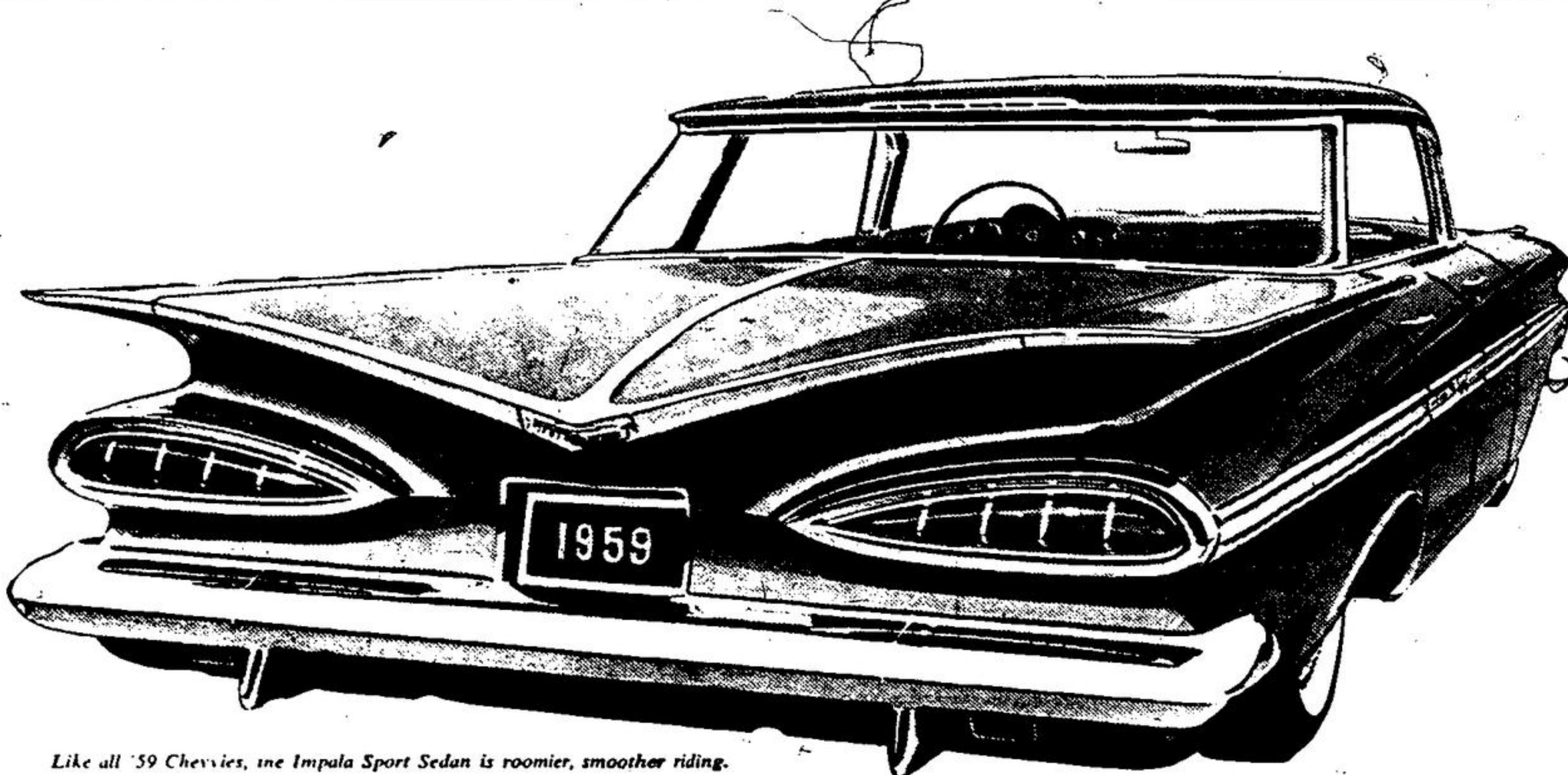

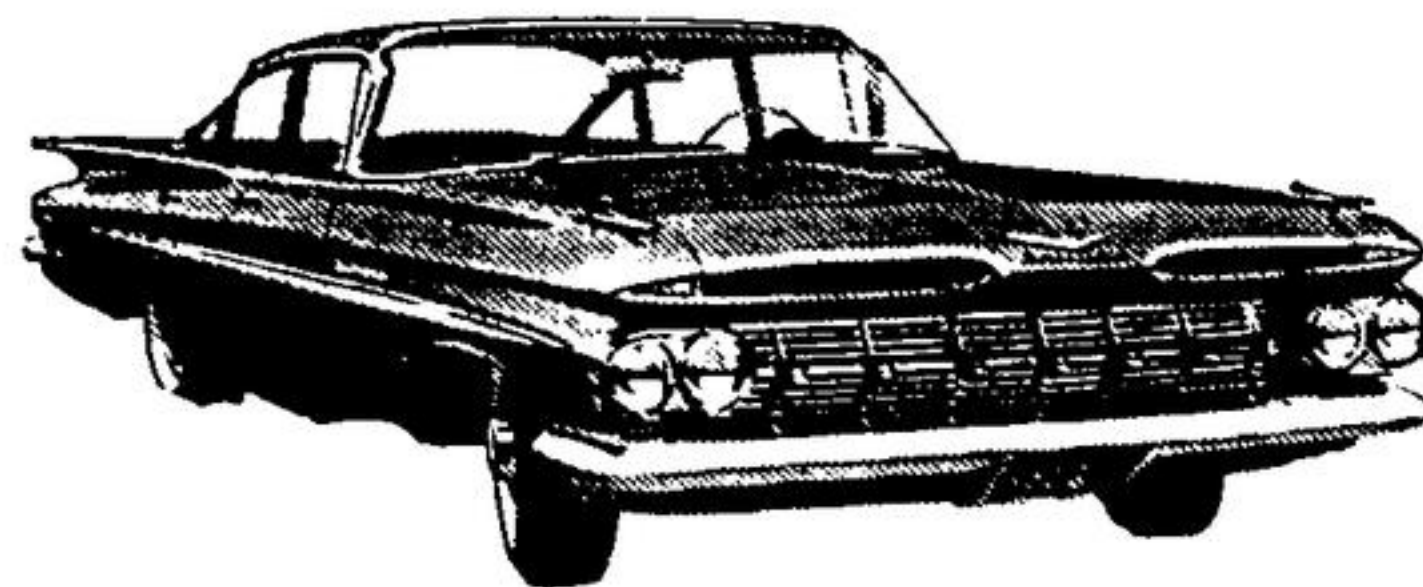
