Framework is of laminated Douglas fir. finished in light pecan stain. A spruce roof deck has a wide overhang which eliminates direct sunlight in classrooms.

The 8-classroom building is enhanced with granite walls and a redwood cross at the driveway approach. Landscaping with evergreens is planned and an tree will grow through an opening in the roof overhang.

Besides classrooms, the building contains a principal's office, teachers' room, and health room. Flooring is of colourful asphalt tile. A large covered play area is provided at thep layground entrance for use during inclement weather. Interior walls are exposed concrete block painted in cheerful colours.


