

**TENNESSEE MAN VISITS AS SPEAKER FOR BAHAI**

Winston Evans of Nashville, Tennessee, will be the guest speaker at a public meeting in the McGibbon Hotel sponsored by the Georgetown Bahai' community on Saturday evening, October 25th. His subject will be "Christ and Baha'ullah." A member of the Baha' World Faith for 21 years, Mr. Evans has travelled throughout the U.S. and visited many parts of Canada to

He represented the Baha' faith at the meeting of the World Council of Churches at Evanston in 1954, and has lectured at many colleges, including Texas Christian, Arkansas, Minnesota and Houston. At Anderson College in Indiana, he represented the Baha' faith at a recent lecture series on comparative religion. Mr. Evans is a graduate of the University of the South (Sewanee.)

**Designed Georgetown's New Holy Cross Separate School**

The Toronto firm of Cox and Moffet were architects for Holy Cross School, Georgetown's new Roman Catholic Separate School which held open house Friday evening and again on Sunday afternoon for parishioners and the general public.

The 8-room school is a beautiful example of a modern, single storey building, and is particularly noteworthy in its skilful blending of colors.

The partnership was formed this year. E. C. S. Cox has a 30-year background of experience in building design since receiving his architectural education at McGill

University and Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He practiced in Montreal prior to serving during the war as an RCAF pilot, and established his own practice in Etobicoke after the war.

A Toronto native, William J. Moffet graduated in 1954 from the School of Architecture, University of Toronto. He was with Earle C. Morgan for two years, then joined Mr. Cox in business. Holy Cross is one of many schools which they have been commissioned to design, and their work also comprises office buildings, factories, and a number of churches.
