Apprehend Youths For Vandalism, Car Theft
Two teen age youths have been apprehended by local police in connection with vandalism perpetrated at Harrison public school over the Thanksgiving week-end. A number of other youths yet unknown were involved in the malicious escape which resulted in close to \$100 damage in broken windows at the school. Just returned home after a three month visit in England, their first time in their homeland in 35 years they marked their 50th wedding anniversary with Open House on Sunday of Thanksgiving week-end. And, ten days before their return to Canada, a pre-celebration party was held in Wisbech when their wedding attendants, Mr. Harry Bennett and Mrs. Alice Mary Dack, who is Mrs. Weston's sister, were present with other close friends. A recording, secretly made at the party, was played during the evening reception in Georgetown, recalling that happy time.

Besides many local friends who were others from Hamilton, Aurora, Oshawa, Niagara Falls, Sarnia, Brampton, Guelph, Erin and Toronto. From Oshawa came four generations in the persons of Mrs. A. Sleightholme, Mrs. Gordon Leslie, Mrs. Bob Chatterton, and Leslie Ann Chatterton. The guests were greeted at the door by sons Roy of Milton, Ken of Erin and Gladys, Mrs. Steve Eason, who lives next door to her parents. The Westons also have 6 grandchildren and 2 great-grandchildren.

Lovely gifts, including an anniversary clock presented by the family, were on display, and bouquets of mums and roses were in profusion. The family had presented Mr. and Mrs. Weston with a striking bouquet of fifty yellow roses. WHAT COUNCIL DID

Investigate Possibility Municipal Gas Pumps

An addition to the waterworks building estimated to cost \$16,500 could reduce operating costs by twelve or thirteen thousand dollars yearly, according to Mayor Armstrong. Town engineer Wm. Carr presented preliminary sketch plans to council Monday. It is planned to add an apartment for a full-time building attendant, plus ground floor storage space for town trucks and ambulance. Mr. Carr was asked to bring detailed estimates as soon as possible to a meeting.

Drainage problems have plagued installation of sewer and water lines into the new Park school. In fact so much water has been found, that Mayor Armstrong said he would like to see tests made, with a view to pumping it into the distribution system. Mr. Carr said it appears there is an underground lake somewhere in the area.

A stamping and sealing machine is being purchased to expedite work in the municipal office. The \$287 machine has a monthly maximum postage meter rental of \$12, and will save hours of office time. Consideration next year will be given to further mechanizing the office by adding an addressograph and investigating billing machines.

Problem of allowing a building permit for an apartment on Academy Rd. in an industrially-zoned area was relayed to the Planning Board after Assessment Commissioner Joseph Gibbons had asked for direction. Council was divided on opinion, Reeve Sargent said it could be possible that an industry could buy a block of houses and tear them down, and that a new house might be a stumbling block to such a plan. Cr. Harrison pointed out that there is only one building lot left on the street and it is not fair to a property owner to have him hold it for years for a possible industrial location. "They tell us we have to be hardboiled in such cases. Perhaps the only answer is for the town to go into the real estate business and purchase such properties" said Cr. Hyde.

"How can we not approve this request?" was Cr. Harrison's rejoinder. "A man came to town and bought 1800 acres of open land and he can't get an industry to locate. We gave him permission to build 600 houses, so we can't refuse to give another man one permit." Reeve Sargent said that while he can sympathize with the property owner's problems, that if an apartment house is erected, council will have complaints from the new tenants about noise from the Smith & Stone factory and odour from the mushroom farm.

Merchant Breaks Leg Hanging School Drapes

Two misfortunes occurred at the official opening of Holy Cross Separate School on Friday, one a painful one for a Georgetown merchant; the other, while not so important to a person, a loss to a picture history of the town.

While finishing touches were being put to the building in the afternoon, Gordon Garner was installing drapes in the principal's office when he lost his balance on a stepladder, caught his foot between the rungs and fell, suffering a badly broken leg. He was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph, where he will be a patient until able to return home. Photographer Don Ryder, who took the pictures of the opening which appear in this issue, also had a pictorial tragedy when the picture of Bishop Ryan cutting the ribbon was "double exposed" and rendered unusable. The picture procedure was being rushed due to a rain shower at this solemn part of the ceremony and only one shot was taken.
