An so I'll leave you with this note: Don't forget about the bazaar coming up. It's sooner than you think! If it is to be a success, we must start acting NOW!

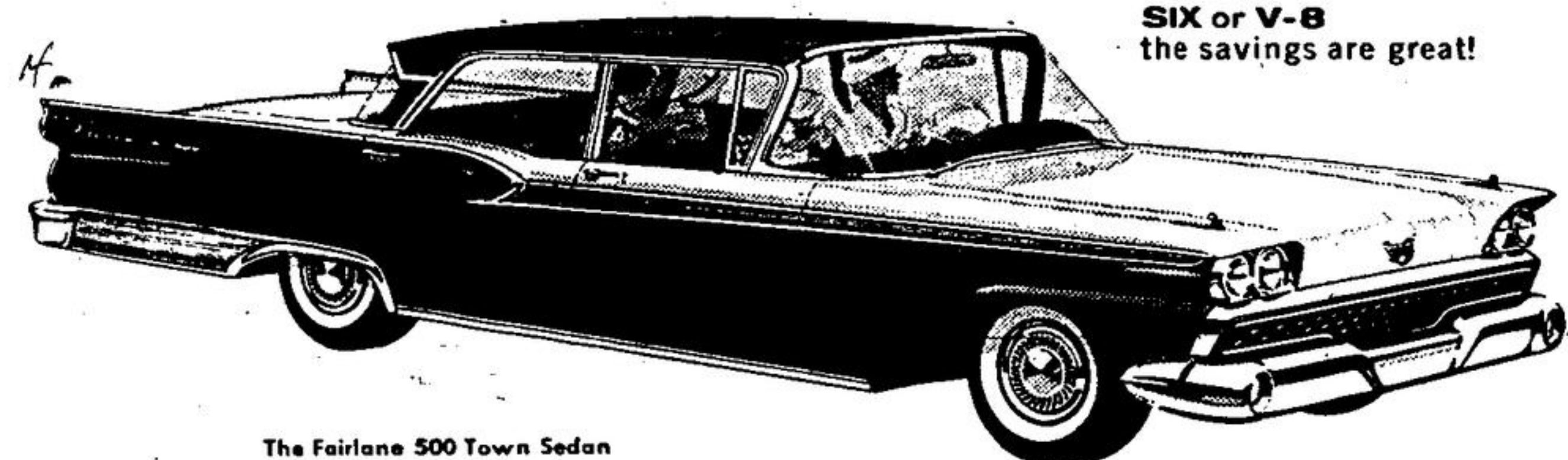

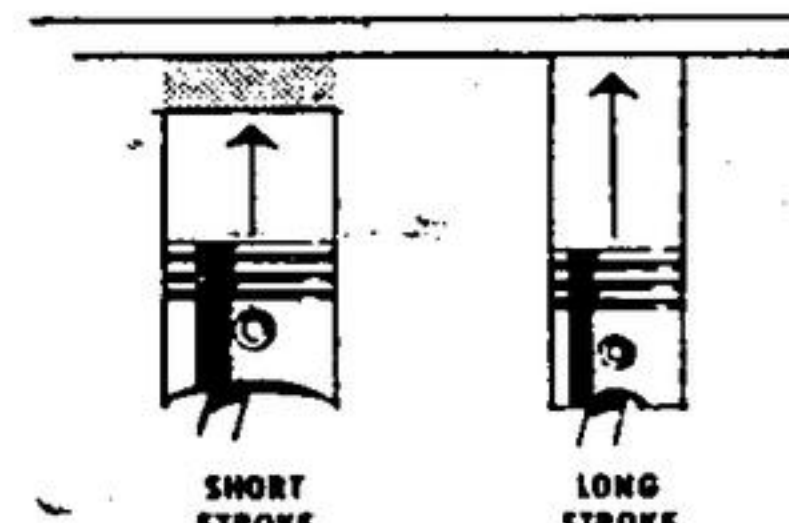

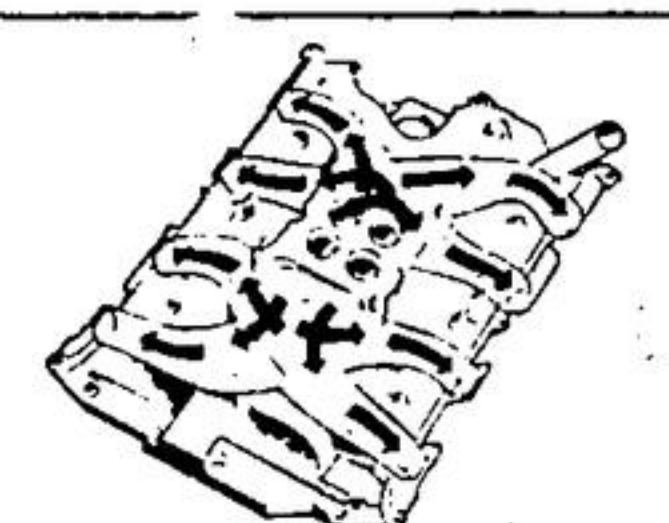
