I have noticed lately that many students do not know how our library functions. Here is some general information for the benefit of those students.

1. The library is open every Tuesday and Thursday from 12.05 to 12.30 and from 3.15 to 3.30.

2. Library books are for the use of all students. It does not cost anything to borrow books from the library.

3. No library cards are issued but the name of the borrower is put on the book-card and filed until the book is returned.

4. Books may be kept out for two weeks. There is a fine of two cents per library day on all overdue books.
