Telephone Rates Will Increase in November

Increases of 10c per month for two-party residence service in Georgetown and of 25 cents for one party residence service becomes effective not before Nov. 1st, following an order of the Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada issued on October 10th. L. G. Denby, Bell Telephone manager here, announced.

The increase for one party flat rate business service is 55 cents monthly which would make the rate \$7.05 a month.

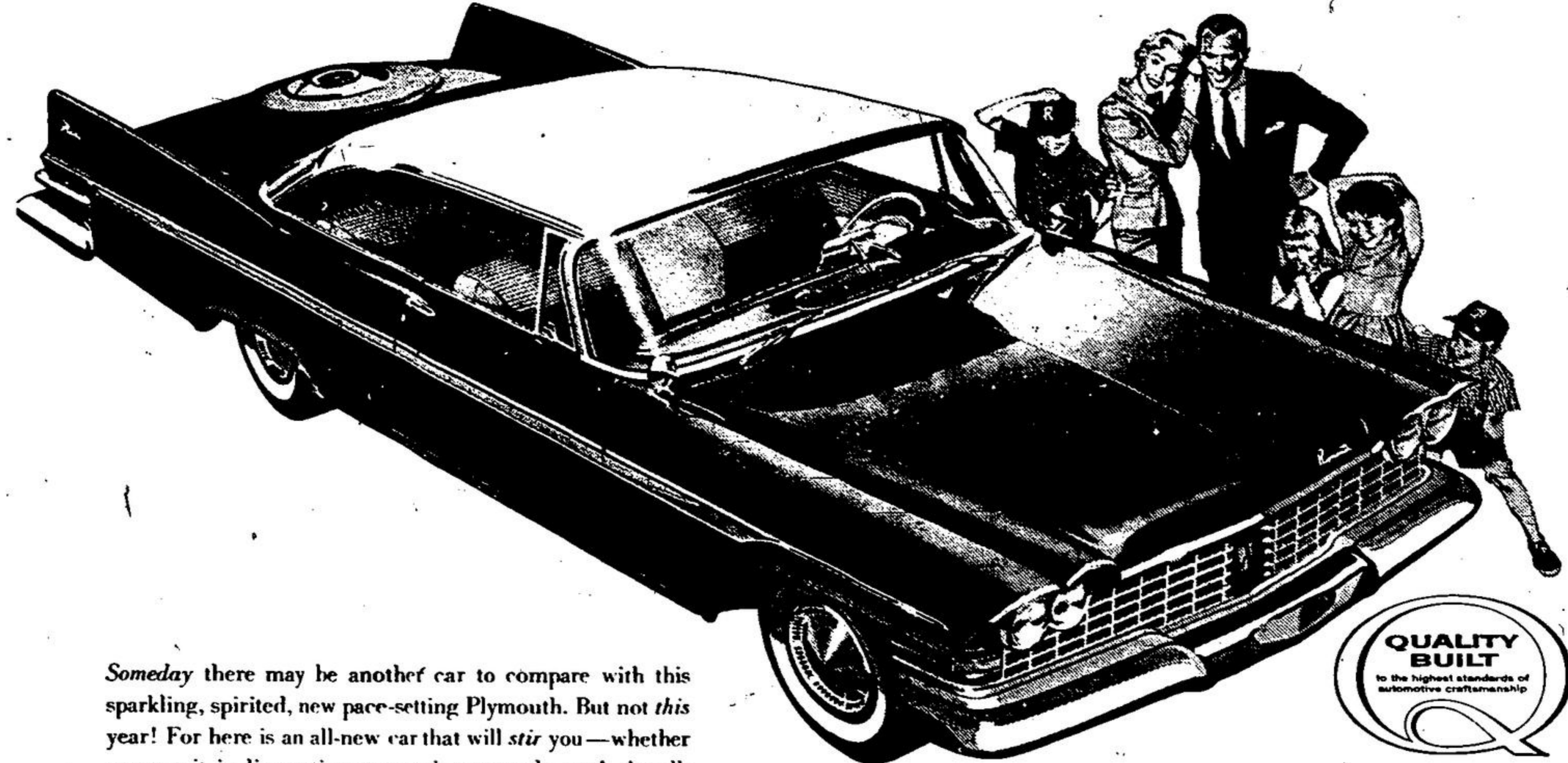
There will also be slight changes in long distance rates in the provinces of Quebec and Ontario.
