CAR DESTROYED IN SILVERCREEK FIRE

A car owned by Raymond Scheffner, 10 Centre Street, Elmira, burned on Wednesday, October 22 near Silvercreek.

Kirch, also of Elmira, was driving the 1951 Packard south on No. 7 Highway toward the town limit when the motor caught fire, at about 6.15 a.m., however, firemen were not notified of the blaze until more than an hour later when the OPP turned in the alarm. By that time the car was beyond saving. A passing motorist who had spotted the blaze stopped at the fire hall on his way through town, but didn't know Georgetown has no firemen on duty or that he could have sounded the alarm by contacting Mr. and Mrs. Oliver in the upstairs apartment.

When the brigade did arrive at the burning car a crowd had already gathered and it was rumoured that a man was trapped in the back seat, but this was later dispelled by the driver who was picked up by the county detachment OPP while walking towards town. Cst. Wm. Bennett investigated.

URGES LOCAL PEOPLE INVESTIGATE BAHAI CLAIM
At a public meeting here on Saturday night, Mr. Winston Evans, of Nashville, Tennessee, explained why the local Bahai community has urged ministers and laymen in an open letter to investigate the claims and teachings of Baha'ullah, founder of the Baha' world faith.

Mr. Evans, who has met with many Christian leaders and who has lectured at numerous universities quoted from a "Christian Century" editorial.

"Civilization is sliding toward the abyss and we refuse to stop it. The highest service which the church can render the nation today is to call people to God in prayer that He will send a leader who will guide our thoughts in a wholly new direction and when that leadership appears that we will have the courage to follow it, and not to crucify it . . ."

"Baha'ullah in 1863 announced to church leaders and monarchs that He was the One promised in the Bible and Holy Books of all past religions," said Mr. Evans. "The leadership promised for our age has appeared and once again it has been crucified. This should not surprise us, because history shows that the founders of all world religions appear as old civilizations disintegrate, and they are always rejected," the speaker said.

Mr. Evans concluded that our generation in this sick and frightened world has the duty to at least investigate what Baha'ullah has written about unifying people, building a world commonwealth, and securing universal peace. There is little time left, he said, to avoid an atomic holocaust and to explore the road to survival and progress.

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WHAT COUNCIL DID

Chamber Asks Merchants Opinion on Parking Area

The Chamber of Commerce will circulate downtown businessmen to see what can be decided about parking, Mayor Armstrong reported to council Monday.

The mayor had sat in on a meeting of business men and Chamber representatives last week, he said, at which a decision had been made to circulate a questionnaire. Businessmen will be asked a number of questions about what they consider the best type of parking and what they might be prepared to contribute financially to a municipal parking area, he said.

A break-down of gas and oil purchases for town vehicles, provided by the clerk, showed an expenditure of \$853 for a 3-month period, and Cr. Ern Hyde estimated that the town would use about 10,000 gallons of gas a year. It was decided to get price quotes from oil companies for supplying gas to the town.

One application received in answer to advertising for a town engineer was filed.

Decision to ask the hydro to install new type street lights on the highway from Rexway to Sinclair Ave., and on the 9th Line to the Sargent Road and Sinclair Avenue caused Cr. Hyde to observe that council is prone to forget that street lights cost money, and that a sidewalk is deferred while a street light never seems to be. Street lights will also be requested on Heslop Court.

Cr. Fred Harrison disagreed, saying that council does not wait for requests to install lights and Mayor Armstrong pointed out that sidewalks are usually installed under a Local Improvement position.

"If we had the same initiative for sidewalks, we would have one on Ewing Street," said Cr. Hyde.

Answering a letter from the town asking if the Delrex firm ment of a \$1,000 yearly fee for town membership in the Metropolitan Toronto Industrial Commission, council was told the firm does not feel the commission is doing any promotion for Georgetown. Membership will be dropped.
