Chamber Asks Merchants Opinion on Parking Area

The Chamber of Commerce will circularize downtown businessmen to see what can be decided about parking, Mayor Armstrong repor-

ted to council Monday. The mayor had sat in on a meeting of business men and Chamber representatives last week, he said. at which a decision had been made to circulate a questionnaire. Businessmen will be asked a number of questions about what they consider the best type of parking and what they might be prepared to contribute financially to a mun-

A break-down of gas and oil purchases for town vehicles, provided by the clerk, showed an expenditure of \$853 for a 3-month period, and Cr. Ern Hyde estimated that the town would use about 10,000 gallons of gas a year. It was decided to get price quotes from oil companies for supplyries to be put on by the choir, drew ing gas to the town.

Hyde.
