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
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Open Burlington Bay Skyway Tomorrow



WHEN THE BURLINGTON BEACH SKYWAY is officially opened by Prime Minister Leslie M. Frost next Thursday, October 30th, it will provide (with the approaches) four and a half miles of four-lane controlled access highway to replace the last remaining section of two-lane highway on the Queen Elizabeth Way between Toronto and Niagara Falls. The \$19,000,000 Skyway will eliminate the bottleneck on the Q.E.W. caused by the 30-mile speed limit through the built-up areas of Burlington Beach and Hamilton Beach and the stoppage of traffic when the Burlington ship cand is in operation, as shown in this aerial photo of the Skyway.

View Museum Collection Of Rare, Extinct Birds

Dr. and Mrs. L. Everett Jaquith of Terra Cotta have just returned from New York City where they attended the 75th. anniversary meeting of the American Ornithologists' Union. Mrs. Jaquith is a member of the A.Q.U.

While at the convention, Dr. and Mrs. Jaquith with Mr. J. L. Baillie of the Royal Ontario Museum had the privilege of examining the study collection of rare and extinct birds at the American Museum of-Natural History. Seven species of North American birds are in that collection. All seven were formerly abundant and are now extinct because they were killed in great numbers. We can no longer enjoy seeing Passenger Pigeons, Eskimo Curlews, Heath Hens, Carolina Paraquets, Labrador Ducks, Ivory-billed Woodpeckers or Great Auks.

On Sunday, Oct. 19th, the members of the American Ornithologists Union were entertained at dinner by the New York Zoologists Club and were shown rare birds in captivity at the Bronx

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
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
