The Puppy Fund was given the usual donation of \$25 for their work and accounts were paid for various items, including one for the Crippled Children's committee.

Chairman Ord gave a report on the final figures of the Crippled Children's campaign, and it was announced that the response per letter on an average in Ontario was 49c, while Georgetown was quite high, being 53c. In Ontario some \$824,673.33 was raised for this great work.

It was announced that the tri-club meet of Lion, Kinsmen and Rotary would take place on Monday, November 17th in the Legion Hall.

Attendance in the club this past month has averaged over 85 per cent, and it was noted that at this meeting it was some 96 per cent.

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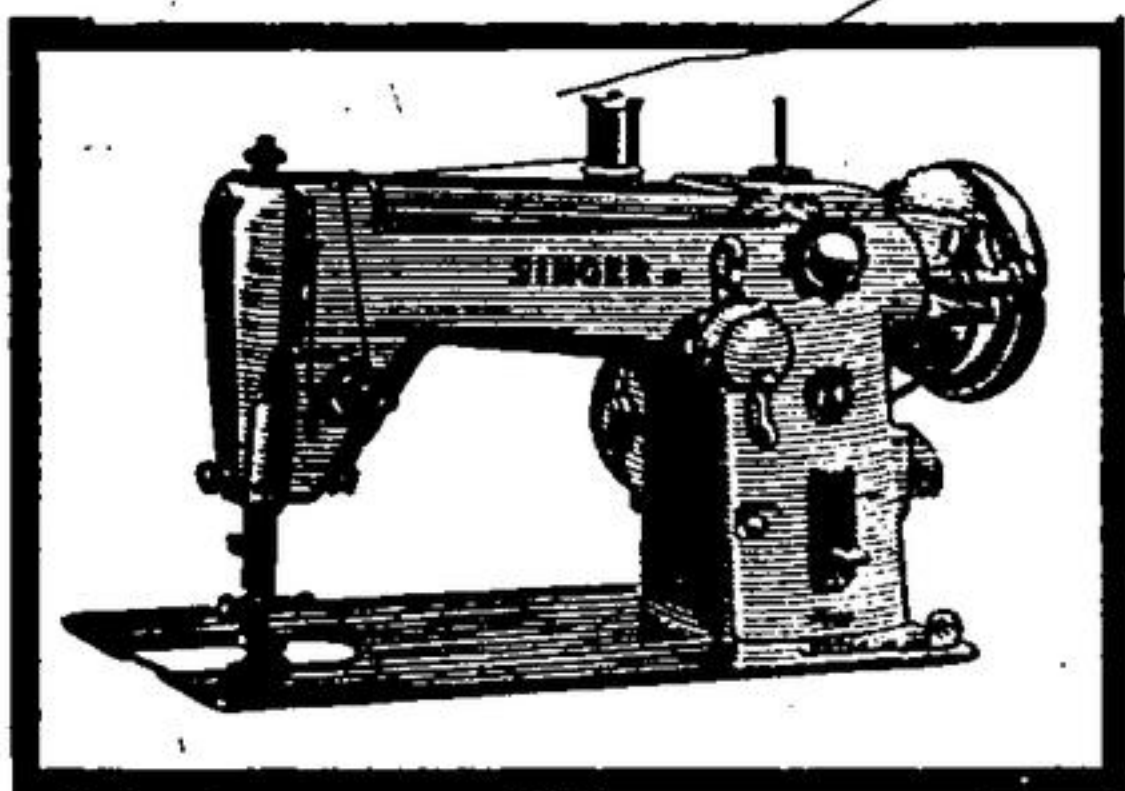
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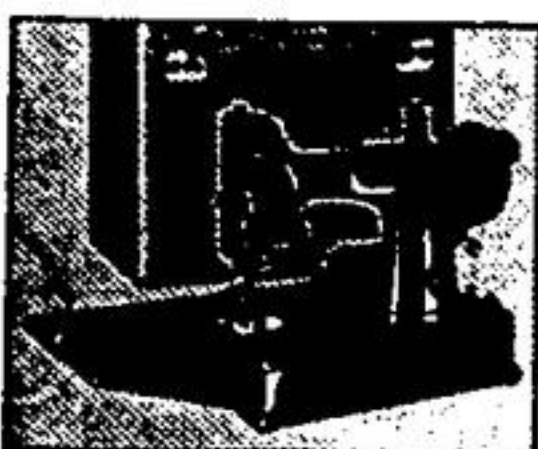
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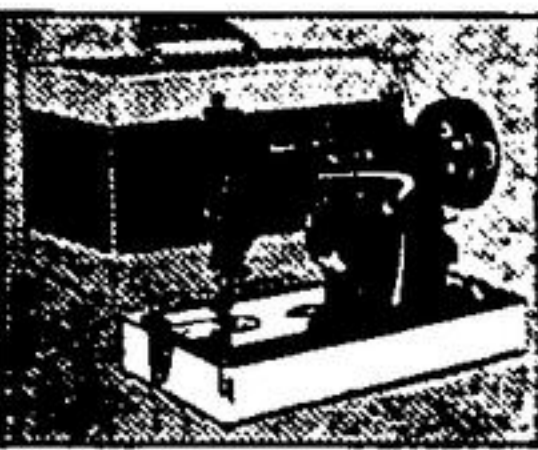
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
