In a personal letter to Mayor Jack Armstrong, which the mayor read at the October 20th council meeting, D. S. Abbott, president of Howard Smith Paper Mills Ltd., spoke highly of the personnel at the local Alliance Paper Mill and was optimistic about the future growth of one of the town's leading industries.

Mr. Abbott, whose company is parent to the Alliance organization, was answering a letter sent to him by the mayor on hearing the welcome news that a major extension will be made to the building, and new machinery added.

## Halton Juniors Among Five Hundred 4-H Clubs at Guelph

Five hundred 4-H club members, from all sections of southern Ontario, participated in the 28th annual Provincial Inter-Club Competitions held at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, on Friday, Oct. 17th. These young people, all between the ages of 16 and 20 years inclusive, were representative of the 22941 club members, who as members of 1970 clubs, participated in Ontario's 4-H programme during 1958.

The event concluded with a dinner, where the 4-H members, their coaches, judges, etc. were guests of the Ontario Department of Agriculture. Here, the Hon. W. A. Goodfellow stated "I consider our 4-H programme, in which local leaders, local spon-

soring organizations, and industry, all work together with the members of our Extension Branch as the most important programme we have in the Ontario Department of Agriculture, since it trains our leaders of the future." Farm people, he added, constitute a bulwark of democracy and serve as a stabilizer in our society. In this connection, the Minister pointed out that farm people solve their own problems and thereby make a contribution to their respective communities and province. "You young people," stated Mr. Goodfellow, "are individualists working together in a great cooperative endeavour."

During the day's lengthy programme, no less than nine competitions in as many different projects were in progress. Halton was represented in five of these competitions. The highlight, perhaps, from a Halton standpoint, was the second place award won by Margaret Lawson and Lorna Woodley, who represented Halton's 4-H Potato Club

in the potato project, where 17 club teams participated. The 4-H Dairy project brought together no less than 55 club teams and here Mary Lawrence and Jack Robertson, representing Halton's 4-H Holstein Calf Club, placed eighth. In beef cattle, 38 4-H club teams participated and here Halton's team of Evelyn and Pat McKay placed eleventh. The 4-H Tractor Maintenance Club project brought together 34 tractor club teams and here Halton's Gen. Stull and Jim Stringer finished in twelfth position. The other project in which Halton was represented was that of the Grain Club project, where 40 club teams were in competition. Here Allan Brownridge and Sandy Barnes represented the Georgetown 4-H Grain Club and Dawn and Eugene Coulter represented the Milton 4-H Forage Club. While neither team finished in the prize money, they, nevertheless, made an excellent showing in the stiff competition. Incidentally, in each livestock and field crop project, the contestants placed and gave oral reasons on four classes of livestock, or grain and small seeds. In addition, each contestant had the added task of orally answering six questions pertaining to their club project. The tractor contestants, on the other hand, had the task of driving a tractor with a wagon attached through a course of off set stakes and backing the wagon up to an unloading platform. In addition, they too faced added tests of determining faulty adjustments on a given tractor and of answering an oral quiz pertaining to tractor operation, maintenance and farm safety. All in all, it was a tired but none the less happy group of Haltonites who returned home at the conclusion of the day's heavy programme.

The afternoon session opened with Hymn 403 and prayer by Mrs. E. Leaker.

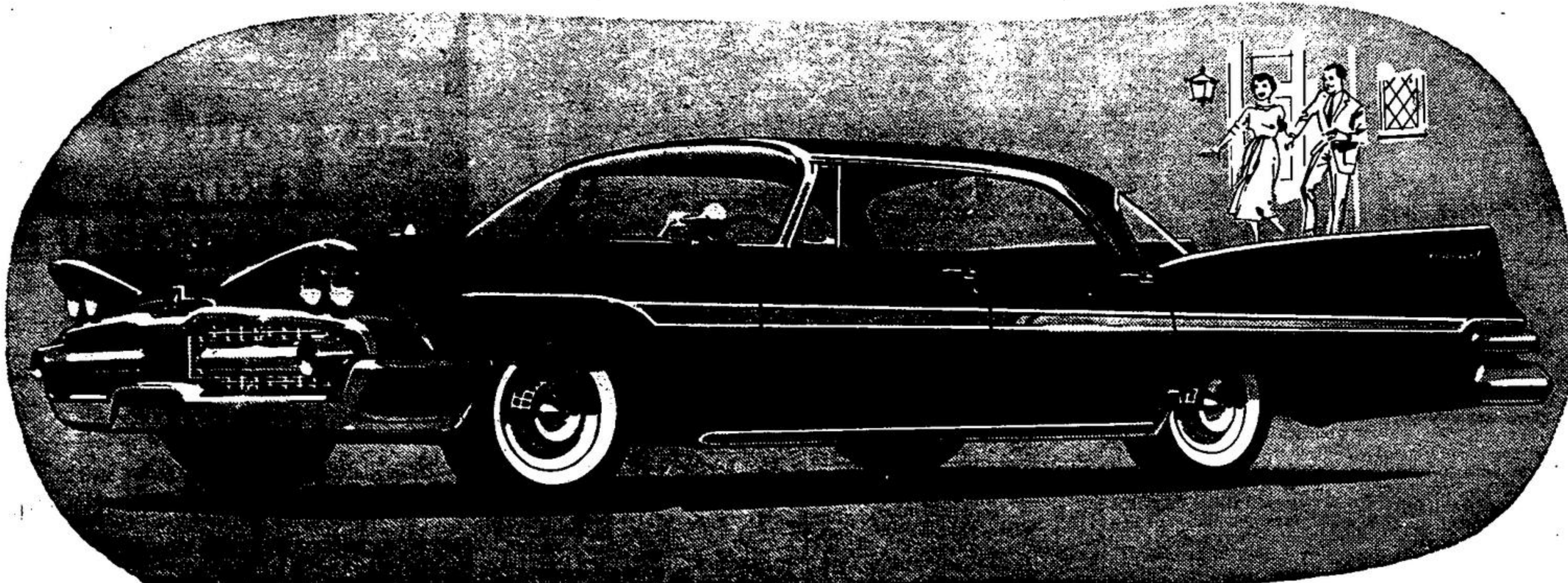
Donations were made to Cedarvale School at this time. A solo by Mrs. John Pallett, "O Praise the Lord" was very much enjoyed by all.
