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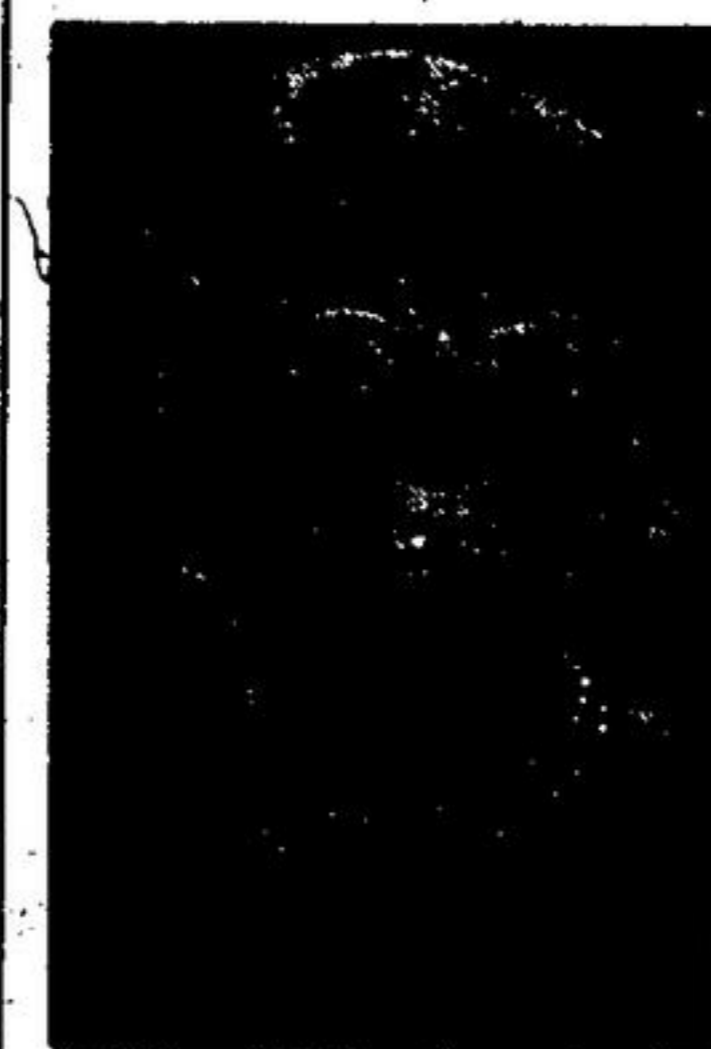
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200 LADIES HEAR JANE SCOTT SPEAK

Charles Bonney of Princeton, newly crowned champion tractor plowman at the recent International, again demonstrated his uncanny ability with a tractor plow, by winning firsts in the open tractor and the open utility classes at Halton's annual match held on the Martin Van den Boom farm near Milton, on Saturday, October 25th.

Weather conditions were disagreeable and reacted on the entry and attendance alike. Forty ridges were tilled and according to Winfred Timbers of Stouffville and Geo. Hostrawser of Kitchener, who were the official judges, the quality of the work was high and compared favorably with that seen at any match this year. Both judges commented on the excellence of the workmanship in the two utility classes where no handling or coaching was permitted.

The Esso Walking Plow Special which is awarded to the Halton plowman with the best ridge was won by Lloyd May of Milton, R. R. 4. A similar special from the same company, for the best tractor ridge plowed by a Halton plowman was won by Arnold Howden of Milton R. R. 4. The Eaton's of Canada Special for the best ridge by a Halton contestant under 18 years, was won by Keith Leslie of Georgetown R. R. 4. The top plowman in the Ernest Irvine Utility Class, open to Halton, was won by Geo. Dixon, of Georgetown R. R. 4.

Approximately 175 were in attendance for the evening banquet held in the main hall at the Milton fair grounds. Here under the chairmanship of president Leonard Lister of Hornby, there was an interesting programme following the delicious dinner catered by the ladies of the Scotch Block W.I. Rev. G. L. Royal of Norval, who was introduced by Stanley L. Hall, MPP, took as his subject, "Oh, for the Good Old Days."

"Let us first," stated Mr. Royal, "ask ourselves this question — were the good old days really so good, or is it just my imagination?"

"The need of the past and the need of the present is 'Leadership,'" added Mr. Royal, and on this he based his most stimulating and interesting address.

Another pleasing feature of the programme was the recognition and presentation made to Hal-

ton's popular and charming Dairy Princess of 1968 — Mrs. James C. Reid of Georgetown R. R. 2, who it will be recalled was reserve to Janette Lockman of Brant County in the Dalch contest brought together 45 of Ontario's top young ladies from as many different counties and districts.
