### John Lenz President Of Student Council

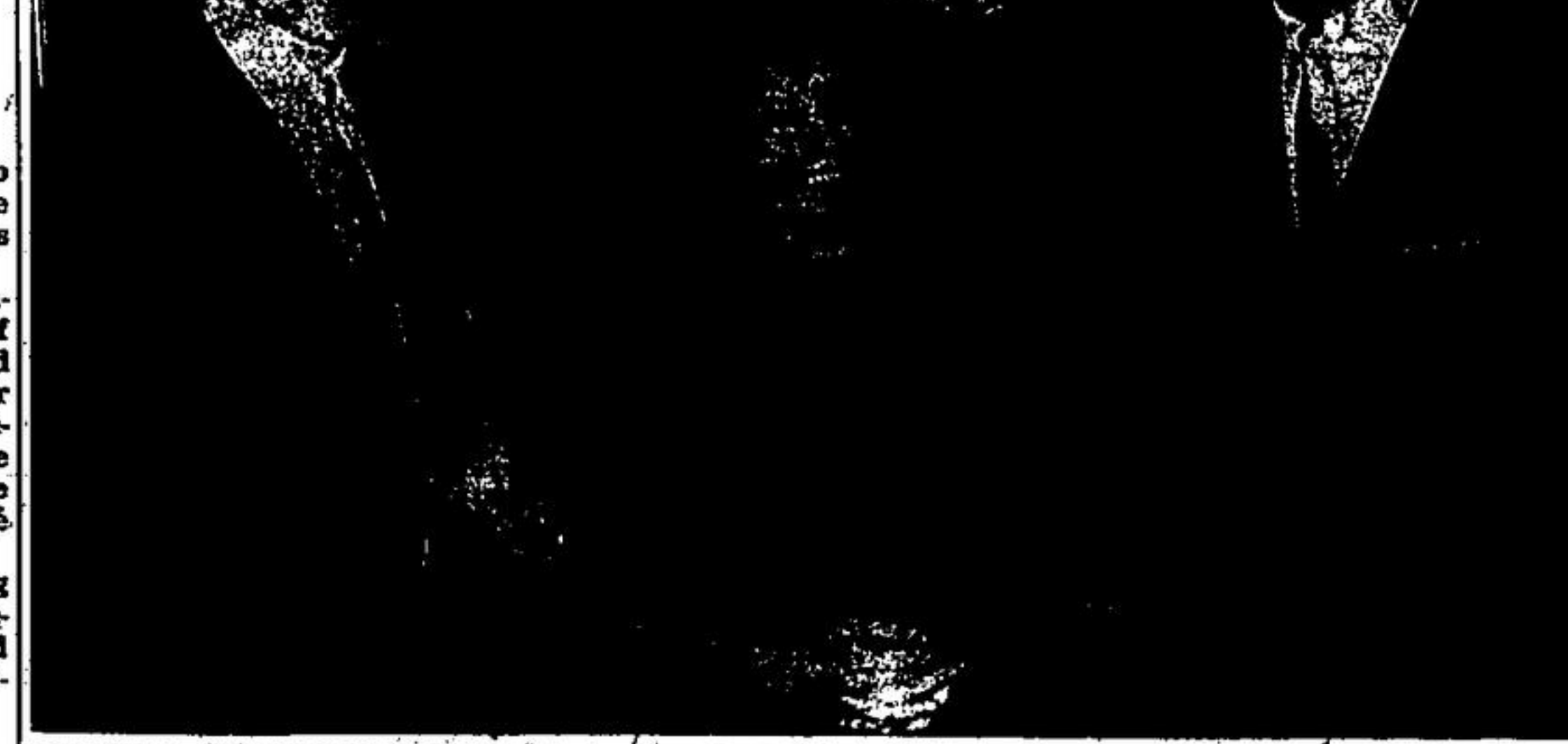
