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FALL FAIRS ASSOCIATION MEETS HERE THURSDAY

The directors and lady directors of the Esqueing Agricultural Society, which just recently sponsored a very successful Georgetown Fall Fair, met on Saturday evening at the home of the president Wilfrid Bird.

Reports were presented by the directors in charge of various classes, and the secretary reported that although the prize money would be much higher this year, he felt the board would break even on the year's business.

Final plans were made for the District 5 convention of the Ontario Fall Fairs Association which will be held in Georgetown for the first time on Thursday of this week, November 6th. It is expected there will be a large delegation as the district extends from Markham on the east to Colling-

wood on the north, Milton on the south. The convention will get underway at 10.30 in the morning at Knox Presbyterian Church Hall, with a turkey dinner at noon, and the resumption of proceedings in the afternoon. During the dinner hour, Rev. L. G. Royal of Norval will give a brief address and Rev. Alex Calder will sing. All Georgetown directors are urged to attend.

Plans were also made for the fair board's annual banquet and a committee appointed. A committee was also named to plan a euchre in Stewarttown hall sometime before Christmas.

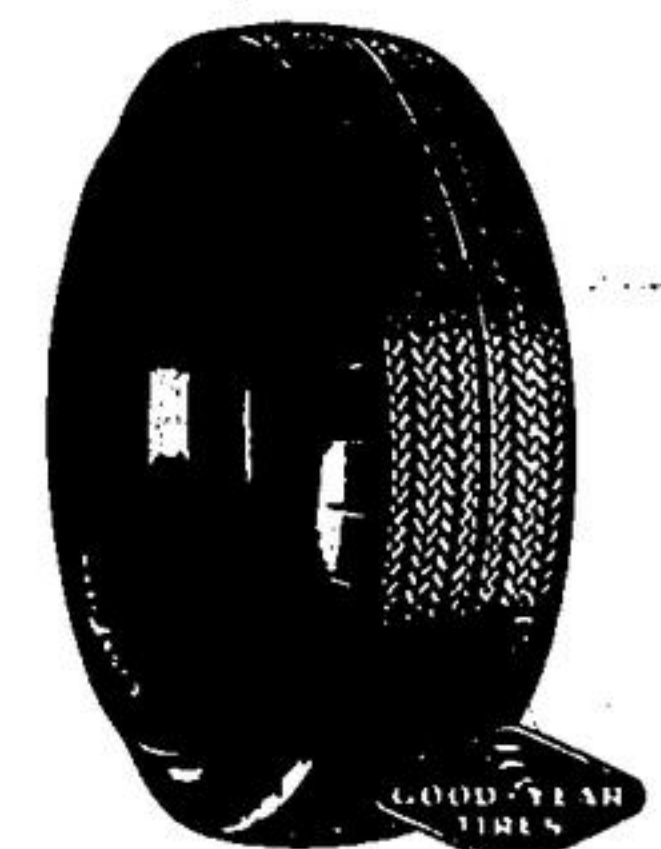
